Revaluation of all the property in the city of Waukegan and North Chicago to 18th street, which has just been completed by Assessor Charles O. Armes is much bigger than that made four years ago.

Mrs. Mary Ann Connell, 79 years old, died Saturday night at eight o'clock at the home of her son, George W. Connell, Milwaukee road west of Zion. She had been ailing for some time.

The county jail was menaced by fire early Friday when the bed of Harry Strickland, a prisoner, caught fire. Strickland's back was severely burned.

The Annual Meeting and Luncheon of the Lake County Bankers Federation was held at the parish house in Libertyville May 2, with about fifty members in attendance.

The loss by fires in Waukegan during the year ending April 30 was \$37,070,000, according to a report submitted by Chief O'Farrell to Commissioner Peter McDermott.

Fire of unknown origin broke out in the Great Lake Naval Training station laundry Saturday night at 10:30 o'clock and caused damage estimated at \$200 to \$300.

Wilfred McElyea, aged 30 years, died this morning at 3 o'clock at the Lake County General hospital after having been ill all winter. His condition became critical during the past week.

He was a veteran of the Civil war serving four years and a half in Co. F, 11th Missouri infantry.

EARTH MOUNDS ARE LASTING MEMORIALS

Archeologist Declares Those in Mississippi Valley Most Enduring

Earthen mounds built by the Indians in the Mississippi valley are more enduring than the pyramids of Egypt, according to Dr. Henry M. Whepley, archeologist and scientist who is excavating in the mounds at Cahokia, Ill.

"Many persons see no reason for excavations in the mounds except for plunder," he said. "As a matter of fact very few mounds have ever been opened which yielded anything of commercial value. The American Indians built these mounds chiefly as memorials. They may have built some as forts and a few as graves, but these were not the most common purposes."
