LASTING MEMORIALS

Archeologist Declares Those In Mississippi Valley Most Enduring

Earthen mounds built by the Indians in the Mississippi valley are more enduring than the pyramids of Egypt, according to Dr. Henry M. Wheipley, archologist and scientist who is excavating in the mounds at

"Many persons see no reason for excavations in the mounds except for plunder," he said. "As a matter of fact very few mounds have ever been opened which yielded anything of commercial value. The American Indians built these mounds chiefly as memorials. They may have built some as forts and a few as graves, but these were not the most common purposes."
