E. L. MILLARD ATTENDS STATE PARK CONFERENCE

National Conference Held at Turkey Run State Park This Week

Representatives of forty states attended a three days session, beginning May 7, of the third annual meeting of the National Conference on State Parks, at Turkey Run State Park, Indiana, 56 miles west of Indianapolis. A permanent organization for the development of state parks throughout the United States was formed by adoption of a constitution under the direction of Everett L. Millard of Chicago.

Charles G. Sauer, Assistant Director of the Indiana Conservation Department, announced that since the first annual conference at Des Moines two years ago, Utah, Nebraska, Missouri, Virginia and Maryland, which had no state parks at that time, have purchased or set aside areas for that purpose. He regarded this as indicating that the development of the national system of state parks will progress rapidly.

Among those attending the conference were Governor Gifford Pinchot, of Pennsylvania, J. Horace McFarland of Harrisburg, Pa., President of the American Civic Association, Stephen T. Mather, Federal Director of National Parks, and Governor Warren McCrea of Indiana, who delivered the address of welcome. Senator James E. Watson of Indiana and Senator Norbeck of South Dakota presided at conference sessions. Richard Lieber gave the history of Turkey Run Park on the opening day.

The American Automobile Association, the National Parks Association, the Dunes of Indiana and the Forest Service, among others, were on the program. After a hike of inspection through the beautiful gorges of Turkey Run Park on the second day, a campfire session was held, with a program in which Indiana participated.

The third day's session was devoted to business relating to the development of state parks including a talk by Dr. Henry S. Cowles of the University of Chicago on the Illinois State Park program, which follows the proposed park survey recently published by The Friends of Our Native Landscape, under the guidance of Jens Jensen.

the possibilities which lie in a graduate year at high school. Mr. Sandwick stated, "Provided the student take five subjects in this graduate year, he can cut off practically a year of his college work. The colleges are overcrowded. Inexperienced teachers are thrust into these deficiencies of the college staff for the first year." He mentioned the advantage of taking vocational work in this fifth year, since Deerfield has such a wealth of equipment along these lines. He made as a last point that a fifth year of study is an excellent way to review for college board examinations. This method is practiced in many preparatory schools.

Questions and Answers

Questions from the parents and the teachers now occupied the place of importance. The inquiries were of the following nature:

- 1 How may the parents control the child's associates?
- 2 Does the school sanction secret societies?
- 3 Is there a friendly contact between the teacher and the child?
- 4 Should a teacher always be present when the children are swimming?
- 5 How can the parent, teacher, and pupil come into more personal relationship?
- 6 Do the pupils get the same food at lunch as we parents received to-day?

The above queries were answered in this manner:

- 1 Invite and keep inviting in your home desirable companions for your child.
- 2 The school does not sanction secret societies; and to its knowledge none exists.
- 3 There is a friendly contact between the child and the teacher as evidenced in the spirit of the school
