CARBON BLACK IS WIDELY UTILIZED

Product of Gas Flames Is One Of Most Useful Articles In Industry

When a smoky flame of gas is burned against a metal surface, it becomes carbon black, an almost impalpable black fluff like that found on the chimney of a smoky lamp.

Nearly 50,000,000 pounds of carbon black are produced yearly in the United States, according to the government bureau of mines, for which some 40,000,000,000 cubic feet of gas are needed.

Twenty million pounds of carbon black go into rubber tires, 12,000,000 pounds into printer's ink and 5,000,000 into shoe polish, while smaller quantities are used in the production of paint, phonograph records, carbon paper, crayons, typewriter ribbons, leather and insulating materials.

Deerfield-Shields high school baseball team won its first league victory last week by defeating the Waukegan school team, five to three, in a fast contest. Deerfield-Shields team made nine hits to their opponents' six, and only two errors to the Waukegan team's three. Dyer and Wiberg were the battery for Deerfield and Macklin and Doyle for Waukegan.

In a game with LaGrange last week Deerfield lost, 5 to 4. It was a hard-fought battle. Deerfield made nine hits, but they were scattered.

WOULD LEVY TAX ON ALL LEGAL VOTERS

Taxing each man and woman of more than 21 years of age \$5 a year in order to make them vote is a new idea in Illinois politics presented in house bill 590, introduced by Representative Howard P. Castle of Barrington, Cook county.

Mr. Castle's bill has caused much comment among members of the legislature, and it is expected will be an interesting subject in the committee on elections when called for consideration. The introducer of the bill is a republican and is chairman of the house judiciary committee. He is one of the most conscientious of Illinois legislators.

The title of Mr. Castle's bill is: "A bill for an act to secure the attendance of voters at the polls by imposing a tax and providing for payment or satisfaction thereof."

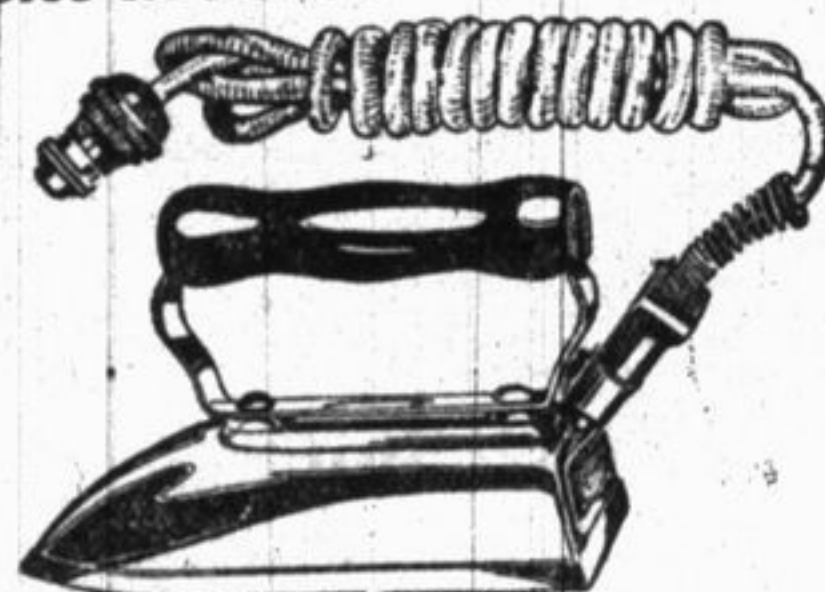
