### LANGUAGE OF U. S. TO LEAD IN WORLD

Belief That English as Spoken In America Will Be Most Widely Used

Professor William Frank Bryan of the department of English of Northwestern university is of the firm belief that the language as spoken and written in the United States will take precedence over English as used in England as a world tongue. His reason for this is the growing use of colloquialisms in the written word.

"In other words," said Professor Bryan, "ours is a living, throbbing language taking breath from everyday life. The aim of our writers seems to be to inject daring forms into their work, to get away from the rhetoric and moulds made fashionable for a time by the old masters."

Speaking of the possibility of the English of America in time becoming so distinct from the English of England as to merge into a separate language Professor Bryan declared that with modern inventions there was little likelihood of this being brought about. Neither did he expect the development of dialects to the extent they have developed in Europe.

"Even the vogue of Cambridge and Boston is dying," he said.

To young America Professor Bryan sends this message:

"Learn at least two foreign languages. The study itself will open windows to the mind that will mean much for you and the world."
