### NORTH SHORE WOMEN IN SWIMMING STUNTS

Exhibition to be Given in the  
Northwestern Gymnasium  
on June First

North Shore Women will give an exhibition of swimming and life saving in the Northwestern University gymnasium, Friday morning, June 1. These women are members of Coach Tom Robinson's community swimming class, organized especially for adult women who live along the north shore between Chicago and Lake Forest. Coach Tom says that they will be prepared to show what can be accomplished by swimming fifteen minutes a day for only a few months.

For several weeks Tom has been giving the class intense drilling in life-saving and the Shaffer method of resuscitation. Each of the thirty women participating in the carnival will demonstrate twelve ways of rescuing a drowning person, four breaks for a so-called death grip, and the procedure for reviving the rescued.

### STEEL FOR ORRINGTON ROOF GARDEN ARRIVES

Roof Garden and Ball Room  
92x28 Well Under Way;  
Will Overlook Lake

The big steel girders for the roof garden and ball-room of the Orrington have arrived and work will soon be under way on the construction of a ball room approximately 92 feet by 28 feet.

There will be verandas overlooking the landscaped roof north and south, from the ballroom. Opening off the west wall, on either side of the elevator lobby will be two reception rooms, or private dining rooms. Kitchen equipment will be provided for the serving of light refreshments.

Beautiful windows will be set into the north, south and east walls of the ballroom, presenting an imposing view of the lake by day or moonlight.

The roof garden will offer the children a safe and healthful play ground by day and by night a romantic promenade for the dancers.

Just above the ballroom in the tower will be a gentlemen's smoking room, overlooking the lake and surrounding country.

### URGE EXCHANGE OF VICTORY NOTES

Victory Notes which matured May 20th have ceased to bear interest. Owners who still hold these notes are urged to exchange them at once for U. S. Treasury Savings Certificates so that their investment will continue to earn interest for another five years.

The new Government Certificates are issued in denominations of \$25, \$100 and \$1,000. They may be registered in one or two names and will be paid to either person or to the survivor. These new securities are the only demand obligations issued by the U. S. Government and may be "cashed" at any time if the owner needs money before they mature. Complete information regarding the exchange of Victory Bonds may be obtained at the Postoffice.
