THANK OFFERING OF WOMEN'S AUXILIARY OF EPISCOPAL CHURCH

Report Shows That Triennial Fund Totals \$681,145; is Received From 4,000 Church Societies

The annual report of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Episcopal Church which has just been submitted to the National Council by Miss Grace Lindley, executive secretary, shows that the triennial united thank offering of the organization to the general church, which was estimated at \$669,426 at the general convention in Portland last September, has been increased to a grand total of \$681,145.09.

Large Membership This organization which is composed of the active women workers of the Episcopal church, now has a membership of more than 250,000 divided among 4,000 branches operating in every section of the country and with ramifications in practically every part of the world. It is one of the most influential subsidiary branches of the Episcopal Church. Its work is directed largely toward the mission field, and the present report notes the fact that through its efforts fifty missionary recruits were secured during the year. Not alone in the mission field, however, but in practically every branch of the Church's work is its influence felt.

Among the more important activities in which the Auxiliary interested itself during the year and upon which it brought to bear the influence of its 250,000 members, were prison reform, adequate care of disabled veterans, protective laws for women and children, Christian inter-racial and Christian international relations, limitation of armaments and work for Christian unity.

Aids Youth The Auxiliary has also entered enthusiastically into the promotion of the Youth Movement in the Church, and two of the objects to which it is now especially devoting itself are the establishment in New York of a house where volunteers and missionaries on furlough may live while in training, and a school where colored women may be prepared for work among their own people.

TRACK DEPRESSION PLANNED BY ROADS

A \$10,000,000 job of track depression through the north shore suburbs may soon be launched by the North Shore Line and the Chicago and North Western railway according to reports from Waukegan, as a result of the expiration of the former road's franchise to operate through Winnetka. Engineers have the plans almost ready, it is said.

The village authorities in Winnetka have resolved not to renew the franchise, for more than thirty days at a time, until they are promised depression of tracks, to eliminate all grade crossings in their town. The franchise expires this month.

Since there's no way of going around Winnetka, officials of the North Shore Line are arranging with the Chicago & Northwestern railway, whose rails parallel theirs through the north shore suburbs, for depression of both sets of tracks from Wilmette north to Braeside.

Engineers of the Chicago & Northwestern have had the matter under consideration for a long time it is understood.

GOOD PROGRESS ON COURT HOUSE MADE

Good progress is being made on the construction work on the \$300,000 addition to the courthouse, according to Supervisor William J. Obee of Highland Park, chairman of the building committee.

Mr. Obee states that an attempt will be made to have the building under roof by the time cold weather arrives next fall. If this can be accomplished the heating and interior work can be continued through the winter. Superintendent Obee said, and would greatly advance the time of completion.

The greatest difficulty now being encountered is the shortage of tradesmen and laborers, and if the situation does not improve it may prove a serious handicap.

The big concrete mixer is turning out hundreds of yards of material being used in the construction of the foundation and walls, and it has been running steadily.

hotel, the site for which he acquired in 1916. That said improvement is modern, high class, ornate and highly desirable, both as an added improvement, and by reason of the increase in revenue to the city from taxes received from this property.

"That we are satisfied that said improvement will be at all times under reliable and trustworthy management.

"That proposed improvement is now and has been for more than one year prevented for the sole and only reason that the authorities refuse to grant or issue a permit for erection, although the plans in all things comply or will comply with all the building ordinances and regulations.

"The only substantial objection thereto being that said real estate has been zoned as residence property.

Asks Extension

"Believing that such a course is contrary to the best interest of the residents of Highland Park, we take this method of expressing our best judgment in this matter and most respectfully ask that the business district be extended to include the property in question and that the building permit be issued so that construction of above mentioned hotel may proceed at the earliest date possible."

The present administration has had no opportunity to act in the matter, and the petition is not an attempt "to force the City's hand." It
