RARE COLLECTION OF RELIGIOUS ART

A REMARKABLE EXHIBIT

Florentine and Siena Schools Are Represented in Display Loaned Institute by Mr. McCormick

A collection of rare and valuable religious paintings of the early Florentine and Siena schools is being shown at the Art Institute beginning May 22 and continuing throughout the summer. The paintings, known as Italian primitives, are lent to the Institute by Cyrus H. McCormick, Jr., who collected them before the great war. Paintings of these schools are greatly sought after by collectors, and have become so rare that they are now practically unobtainable.

During the 13th, 14th, and 15th centuries there flourished two great schools in northern Italy. The Florentine School was the more progressive and possessed a finer sense of rhythm in line and a greater ambition to obtain rich and dramatic effect in color and composition. The Siense School held fast to the traditions of Byzantine art, to which it was firmly wedded. While its methods were more restrained and conservative than its Florentine neighbor, the Siense School manifested deeper religious feeling and a sincerity and reverence which adds greatly to their value as expressing the religious fervor of the times.

Nine Florentine Paintings

There are nine paintings of the Florentine School. "The Madonna in Landscape" is wondrously beautiful. It was done by Jacopo del Sellaio (1441-1493) and shows the Madonna praying in adoration of the Child. The coloring is rich and yet singularly refined. "The Madonna, St. John and Magdalen," is attributed to Bicci di Lorenzo, while not so luxurious in color, yet displays a masterly knowledge of drawing and much feeling in facial expression and in form. The "Madonna with S. S. John, the Baptist and the Evangelist," is also attributed to the same artist. There are three triptych paintings in the collection representing scenes in the life of Christ. The small picture "Madonna and Child" by Benvenuto di Giovanni, is worthy of critical study for the exquisite quality of its drawing and color. "The Angel of the Annunciation," by a Florentine artist of the school of Pinturricchio, is one of the gems of this collection, and with others, which have been included in the hanging, is the property of Cyrus McCormick, Jr.

The exhibition will remain on view the greater part of the summer.

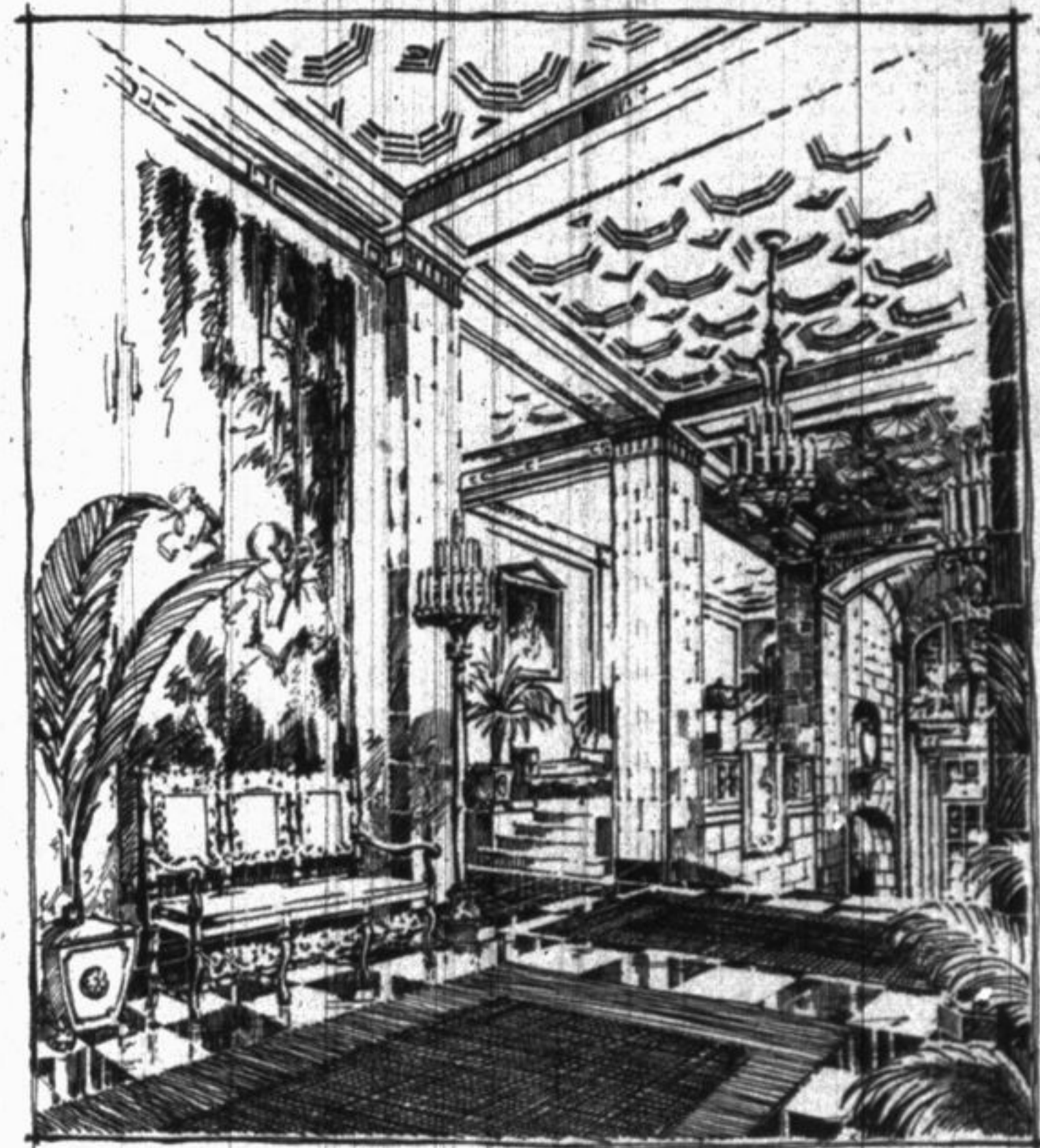
