The Florentine School was the more progressive and possessed a finer sense of rythm in line and a greater ambition to obtain rich and dramatic effect in color and composition. The Sienese School held fast to the traditions of Bysantine art, to which it was firmly wedded. While its methods were more restrained and conservative than its School manifested deeper religious feeling and a sincerity and reverence which adds greatly to their value as expressing the religious fervor of the

are three Sienese paintings, one by Guidoccio Cozzarelli, of Madonna venuto di Giovanni (1436-1518) of with S. S. Peter and Christopher, All of the paintings are on wood. Italian religious painters, as well as Flemish painters, previous to the 15th century, used wood panels. If more than one panel was required, the joints were covered with strips of linen. The wood used invariably was poplar, but someperferred. The paint was a tempera, as oil painting did not come into gentury. 
