AN ARTISTIC ACHIEVEMENT

Approaching opening of the Ravinia summer opera season for the thirteenth year again emphasizes the wonderful opportunity given the people of the North Shore to hear the finest productions of the musical world in all ages. It is an opportunity that thousands upon thousands of music lovers the world over would be glad to enjoy, that thousands would sacrifice much to have at their door. Remembering this the appreciation of North Shore people should be evidenced in material and generous support.

There is nothing like Ravinia elsewhere in all the world. It is peculiarly a North Shore feature, one to be proud of and to boast of, because no matter how loudly its praises are sung, there is little likelihood that the value of Ravinia can ever be exaggerated. In it Mr. Eckstein and his associates have given to the world an artistic achievement that will be a shining mark of beauty and charm toward which the musical world can hope to do little more than aim for many years; it cannot be surpassed, and North Shore appreciation should be commensurate with the greatness of that achievement.

TOO MANY LAWS

One of the strangest political tendencies of our time is the suddenly increased faith of legislators in the power of laws to enforce themselves once they are reduced to writing. No belief has been so continuously and thoroughly discredited; yet none is so alarmingly alive. Every political philosopher from Montaigne's day to this hour has recognized that the best government is that conducted with the least law and machinery.

A multitude of evils attend the naive faith of legislatures in the auto-enforcement capacity of law as represented by words on a piece of paper. One is an inevitable weakening of respect for a government, born of disregard for its more outlandish aspects. Another is the uninterrupted encroachment of government on the governed. A third and most distressing evil is the appalling expense attending the creation of multitudinous new bureaus and offices provided for by new laws.

The time may come when a candidate pledging himself to nothing but the repeal of two laws for every one enacted will be generally supported. We have too many laws and not enough enforcement.

THE FUTURE OF RADIO

Already it reaches ships in any part of the ocean, the isolated farm can listen to music and lectures in the cities. Information is broadcasted to the farmer on crop and weather conditions. Fire warnings have been sent out and the way of the crook will be made harder through ability to broadcast a record of his activities to every community in the land.

The future possibilities of radio are inconceivable. Various principles which will make it more applicable to business and social life are just being worked out. The supreme inventive genius of the country, the greatest organizing ability and the most powerful resources are now at the service of the new art, with the result that radio has made greater strides in the past two years than in the ten years previous.

No other nation has such a combination of air communication resources for the benefit of its people.
