### GETS NOTICE ABOUT SUMMER CAMP PLANS

Director Walkup of Community Center Has Information From Headquarters

Director E. L. Walkup of Community Service has received from the Playground and Recreation Association of America notice that plans for immediate study of summer camps in the United States by the association were announced June 1, in New York City, at a meeting of a special committee on camps appointed by Joseph Lee, the association's president. The study which is financed by the Laura Spelman Rockefeller Memorial will be under the leadership of L. H. Weir, an expert on camps and municipal recreation, and will include the preparation of a practical summer camp handbook, the association states. Information assembled will be arranged with a view to helping existing camps and to pointing out to future camps the highest and most practical standards of business, health and social administration.

There are approximately 5,000 summer camps in the United States attended by several hundred thousand boys, girls and adults annually, the announcement states. Many camps are conducted by recreational agen-

cies, business men's clubs, settlements and churches. However, 330 are private. The last few years have seen a vigorous growth in the municipal camp idea and there are more than 125 vacation camps operated by cities.

### SECOND RIFLE SHOOT HELD AT FT. SHERIDAN

Scoring 141 of a possible 150, D. E. Brunn of the Irving Park Rifle club led the field in the second summer shoot held under the auspices of the Chicago Rifle association Sunday at Fort Sheridan.
