

MAYOR HASTINGS TO TALK AT LAKE FOREST

TO DELIVER 4TH ADDRESS

Mayor Rumsey Commends Speaker in An Open Letter to People of City

Mayor Samuel M. Hastings of this city will deliver the annual Independence Day address at Lake Forest in connection with the celebration being arranged for that holiday.

In announcing this fact Mayor Henry A. Rumsey had the following words to say in an open letter to his city.

"Mr. Samuel M. Hastings, one of Chicago's really big men, at one time a suggested candidate for governor of Illinois, has consented to give part of his holiday to us and will make the annual Independence Day address.

"There can be few who do not know of the wonderful record of Mr. Hastings made in every phase of his busy life. He has just returned from a tour of parts of Europe as one of our country's business experts, having been chosen a member of the party, because of his outstanding qualities of broad vision and power of insight, to investigate conditions existing in southern Europe.

"Mr. Hastings is a gentleman who believes in national and civic righteousness and service and backs his beliefs by his works. To those who may not know him let me say that we are proud to be able to make this announcement and grateful to him for his willingness to sacrifice his more personal pleasure and come to us; to meet him is to admire him, to know him is an inspiration."

The fact that Mayor Hastings is scheduled also to make an address at the Fourth of July celebration to be held in this city under the auspices of the Elks lodge, indicates that his holiday will be a busy one.

ADVICE FOR BATHERS WORTH REMEMBERING

Here are several "Don'ts" for bathers that are worth remembering, considering the rather large number of drownings so early in the season, throughout the country.

A few days ago a boy at Jerseyville dived into shallow water and was drowned before aid could arrive. Two days later two school girls were drowned in Shoal Creek near Panama, Montgomery county. There have been four drownings in Lake county this season. A young man dived off a pier at Crystal Lake last week and did not come up. The following advice to bathers, if broadcasted in every community, and observed, will save many lives:

- Don't swim on a full stomach. Wait at least two hours after eating. Don't swim if overheated. Don't swim if you have heart trouble.
- Don't dive without accurate knowledge of the depth of the water. Don't struggle if caught in a swift current or undertow; the flow of the current will bring you to the surface. Don't wade into the water with arms over your head; you will not be ready to stroke if you step into a hole.
- Don't lean backward when wading into the water; always be ready to fall forward.
- Don't cry for help in fun; you may some time need help and not get it. Don't fail to learn the Red Cross life saving and resuscitation methods. Be capable of saving yourself and your companions.
- Don't go in swimming alone unless you are an expert.

VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL'S PROGRESS

200 Schools Held Last Year In Chicago District; Many Denominations

The Daily Vacation Bible School movement began in New York over 16 years ago. The International Daily Vacation Bible School association reported over 1500 schools in the country during 1920, and many of the schools which were held did not send in formal reports to that organization. In the years since that time, great gain has been made in the number of schools held and the pupils enrolled, and the work has been widely extended in the Orient and in the European countries. The Chicago Church Federation, Daily Bible School Commission, reports that there were 200 schools held last year in the Chicago district, with a total enrollment of something over 29,000, and representing 14 different denominations.

Such schools are vitally needed in churches that are well-organized, and where the children come from good homes where there is the best sort of Christian training. Because of concentrated, continuous work, the correct methods used, and the personnel of the teaching staff, the work done in the five week term is more than equivalent to a full year's work in the church Sunday school morning sessions. Pupils who attend are brought into a closer relationship with God as their heavenly Father and with Jesus Christ, their friend and hero; their loyalty to the Kingdom of God and to Christian institutions is increased; their store of knowledge is widened and enlarged; their appreciation of right and wrong deepened, and their ability to make right choices increased. The joyful atmosphere of the school and classrooms tends to show them that Christianity and true happiness are synonymous, and through their work they come to see the integral place that religion must hold in their lives if completeness is to be attained.

LINCOLN CAR PILOTS SHRINERS' CARAVAN

Heads Auto Delegation to Recent Convention and Now on Way to California

When the Shriners' auto Caravan, now on its return trip to California, arrives in Highland Park interest is certain to center in the Lincoln pilot car driven by Capt. Bernard S. McMahan, secretary-treasurer manager of the National Shrine Touring club. Captain McMahan piloted the caravan from Oakland, Calif., to the recent annual meeting of the imperial council at Washington, D. C., arriving there June 4, and creating something of a sensation among the thousands of Shriners present for the big gathering.

The Lincoln touring car which Captain McMahan drives, and which is painted white, has considerable of a history. It is now on its second round trip of the continent and Captain McMahan has driven it more than 62,000 miles with never a falter in its performance.

The caravan left Washington June 9 for the return trip and was augmented by a number of eastern Shriners who will accompany it on its tour of the west. It is due to arrive here June 27 or 28.

STATE HARD ROADS BUILT THIS YEAR

Good Progress Being Made in 1923 Program, According to Engineer's Report

In the single week ending June 14, according to the report submitted to Governor Small by Frank T. Sheets, superintendent of highways, there were constructed in Illinois 33 miles of standard 18 foot concrete pavement bringing the total up 207.32 miles for the present year.

The report shows that 8,100 men were employed on various road construction jobs for the week covered in the document and 1,850 teams—a veritable army of man power and equipment, not to mention the vast volume of motor machinery—were working. In this latter equipment are 104 concrete mixers.

So state road construction for 1923 is climbing toward the peak. The goal on the season's construction is above 50 miles weekly. Weather conditions have favored construction in some sections and slightly militated against progress in others. The single shift construction record covered by the report was attained by the W. C. Menecky company, which built 5,243 feet of completed pavement in a week only a few feet short of a mile.

DETOURS IN GLENCOE FROM SHERIDAN ROAD

A portion of Sheridan road in Glencoe has been marked by barricades and detour signs in view of the wrecking of the Hawthorne and Stone bridges on the drive, preparatory to the construction of new ornamental concrete bridges at those locations.

Village authorities have announced that detours will be necessary as follows:

North bound traffic over Green Bay road; south bound traffic on Vernon avenue to North avenue and thence to Sheridan road.
