SATURDAY AFTERNOON HOLIDAY IS VETOED

Employees of the Circuit and County courts in Lake county as well as other counties in Illinois learned with a sigh that Gov. Len Small had vetoed the bills of Representative Roger Little providing for the closing of the recorder's and clerks offices in county, Superior, Circuit courts Saturday afternoons.

Lake county working under the second class which is determined by a population of over 50,000 and less than 100,000, would have been affected by the bills allowing the holiday. Circuit and county clerks would have been permitted by law to close their offices for the Saturday half holiday. As it is now they will have to work Saturday afternoon as heretofore.

Except for the stenographic employees of the Circuit clerk and recorder's offices, the forces in the local court offices are working Saturday afternoon.
