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CIVIL WAR VETS' COMBINED AGES

The combined ages of all the Civil War Soldiers and Sailors who attended the 45th Annual reunion of the Association at Foss park, Waukegan, recently, was 4,384 years, and the oldest veteran in the county is George Meade, of Hainesville. It was said that Thomas Dwyer, of Waukegan, is the oldest veteran in the county, being 89 years old, but there were two older, Mr. Meade being one, and there is another who is 90.

Out of the total of 55 veterans registered, the average age was 79 years and nine months. The oldest is 91 and the youngest 74. There were four who are 74 years old.

Mr. Meade served in Company F, 56th Illinois Infantry.

There were nine veterans at the reunion who registered their ages as 77, six gave their age at 81.
