HERE IS A WORTHY CAUSE
 In its appeal to the people of Highland Park for assistance in raising funds with which to carry on its splendid work in this community the local Young Women's Christian Association should have prompt and liberal response. There is no organization nor institution in this country that is doing greater good among the young women of the land than is the Y. W. C. A. It supplements the church; it aids the school; it helps its members in business and social life; it provides christian environment for girls far from home; it affords its members association with women of all groups making for democracy in leadership and equality of opportunity for all.
 Perhaps in some quarters it is not realized that in Highland Park there are many girls to whom the Y. W. is of great benefit. In the city, according to carefully compiled statistics, there are approximately 1,000 girls of all ages. Of these 593 are employed as teachers, nurses, phone operators and in banks, stores, restaurants, hotels and other work. More than 100 of these employed girls are lodging here at greater or less distance from home and home influences. For all of these the Y. W. has proved a friend in need.
 For girls who have good homes it affords the means for participation in outside activities under proper environment; it leads and teaches. Its value in the life of the growing girls is beyond estimate. It cannot be too highly praised for its great work in this direction.
 As a clearing house for all sorts of good work in the community the "Y" also deserves mention. It is a valuable bureau of information, a willing aid in preventing delinquency, a friend and a helper to all young women, whose welfare is its first care and whose gratitude it richly merits.
 The Highland Park association in the 12 years of its existence, in which the good work done speaks for itself, has not asked public assistance in providing its annual budget. For this reason also it should now receive prompt and generous aid. The cause is a most worthy one.
