OAK PARK DEFEATS DEERFIELD, 12 TO 3

IN THE HOMECOMING GAME

Visitors Outplayed in First Part of Gruelling Battle; Touchdowns Do Trick; Field Goal for Locals

After outplaying the visitors in the first half, the Deerfield-Shields high school football team lost a hard-fought game on Homecoming Day, last Saturday, to the Oak Park eleven, leaders of the suburban league. The score was 12 to 3. Proctor's field goal accounted for Deerfield's three points. A huge crowd witnessed the game, Oak Park being well represented by rooters.

Newburn's end runs for Oak Park late in the game collected the winning points. It was a gruelling battle on a slippery field, and the Deerfield team, fighting to the last minute of play, fighting a game that left nothing to be criticized. Sweeney, Carr, Reichelt, Dreiske and the two Boylans did yeoman work for the home team. Newburn, Ferretti and Bernard starred for the visitors. The game by quarters is thus described in the Blue and White, the high school paper:

First Quarter

Oak Park kicked off to the 20 yard line. A buck gained two. Another buck failed. Mike Dyer kicked to 40 yard line. Plunge gained two. Ferretti went 10 yards for 1st down. Newburn gained two more.

3 yards. Dever was stopped in his tracks. Mike punted. Kyalla nailed an end run. Delayed buck gained nine yards. End run made 10 yards. Deerfield penalized 15 yards. Buck netted 5 more. Another end run and buck made 1st down. End run made 2 yards. Ferretti made 2 more. Line buck failed. The line held and Deerfield got ball. 2 bucks failed. Mike punted. Buck failed. A pass was incomplete. Pass complete for 20 yards. Ferretti made 1st down. Another pass incomplete. Pass complete for 12 yards. End run lost 2 yards. Buck gained 2 yards. End run short by inches of 1st down. An end run went over (Newburn).

Kick for point failed. Oak Park kicked off to 20 yard line. Pass incomplete. Newburn got tackle play as half ended.

Third Quarter

Oak Park kicked off to 15 yard line. Mike failed to gain. Deerfield penalized 15 yards. Dyer kicked. Buck gained 2 yards. End run made 6 more. Buck made 1st down. Three end runs made touchdown. Missed goal. Three end runs made touchdown. Missed goal. Deerfield kicked to 20 yard line. Oak Park kicked on 1st play. Dever made 7. Dyer made 15 yards around end. Proctor made 3. Dyer made 6 more. Dever made 1st down. Dyer failed to gain. Buck failed. Dyer failed again. Buck failed. Dyer failed again. Place kick fell to Oak Park. End run made 15 yards. Oak Park kicked. 2 runs failed. HIGHWOOD A. C. WINS FROM WAUKEGAN 11

Score is 16 to 6 in Favor of Former For Middle-Wt. Championship

Highwood defeated the Waukegan A. C. last Sunday at the Highwood field, 16 to 6, for the middleweight championship of Lake County.

Rain did not stop the Highwood outfit from winning the hardest game of the season. Waukegan is the only team that ever beat the locals on their home field. Last season they managed to beat the H. A. C. 7-0.

Waukegan broke away for a touchdown in the first few minutes of play but failed to kick goal. They received but Highwood held for downs, returned the punt and after a series of line smashes took the ball to the ten yard line. Scotty Oyer tore through right tackle for the touchdown. Highwood failed to kick, tying the score.

Highwood received and managed to take the ball to the 35 yard line, where the visitors held and on the fourth down regardless of the water soaked ball, Shannon made a perfect place kick. Score 9-6.

The second half started with the old fight, Highwood smashed the line for long gains, completed a pass to Emmett, Hicks intercepted a Waukegan throw, and a series of takes and Lauridsen crashed through the center for a touchdown. Shannon kicked, score 16-6.

The rest of the game was battled in the center of the field neither team showing superiority. The tackling of both sides was sure and hard.

A fair sized crowd stood in the drizzling rain to see the best game ever played on the Highwood field.

Next Sunday the West Side Boosters of Chicago will try their luck at Highwood. They are a strong mid-west team and expect to show the locals a good time.

Highwood this year is playing exceptional football. The team is composed entirely of home talent, many of them never played a game before, while some performed in high schools. They get up all plays themselves and have no coach. Their practicing is done in the evening under electric light.

Capt. Lauridsen, N. Englund, A. Englund, Emmett, Devroeg, Kehrwald, Juhrend, Hicks, White, Barber, and Macomber are members of the Port Clinton A. C., while Oyer, Shannon, Bellef, Weinscht, and Williams are from the fire department.
