PURCHASING POWER OF DOLLAR SHOWN

Comparison of Worth This Year With That in 1913; Seems To Have Shrunk

An interesting study of the purchasing power of the dollar from 1913 to 1923 has been made by the U. S. Bureau of Labor Statistics and published in the September issue of the Monthly Labor Review. According to this survey, the purchasing power of the 1913 dollar, which was taken as the standard, has varied widely in the last ten years. It purchased more commodities in 1914 and 1915 than in 1913, but it began to decline in 1916 until in May, 1920, it was equal to only 40 cents in purchasing power as compared with 1913. In June, 1923, its purchasing power as compared with 1913 was 65 cents.

DEERFIELD DEFEATS NEW TRIER, 21 TO 0

LOCALS NEVER IN DANGER

Easy Triumph for Home Team Over Old Rival Saturday; Play La Grange Here Next Saturday

Deerfield-Shields grid team trimmed New Trier Saturday, on the latter's field, goose-egging the old rival in a score of 21 to 0. Deerfield's goal was never seriously threatened, and while the first half was played in rather listless style, the game was jazzed up somewhat in the last section and Deerfield made a sieve out of the New Trier line. Dever, Dyer, Dreiske, and in fact all of the Deerfield players, made a good showing. The game by quarter is thus reported:

AMERICAN EXPORTS SHOW GOOD GROWTH

Increase Over Last Year And Close to Total of 1913, Says Report

America exported during the first eight months this year goods in the amount of \$2,561,875,000. For the corresponding first eight months in 1922 we exported \$2,423,535,000 worth. For the entire year of 1913, in the pre-war period, our total exports were only \$2,484,000,000. The last eight months have been wholly under the Fordney-McCumber tariff act. The fact that during that time we have exported more goods than we did in 12 months under the Underwood act shows that the protective tariff is not destroying our foreign markets, while the tremendous increase shows that it is not keeping other nations from selling to us.

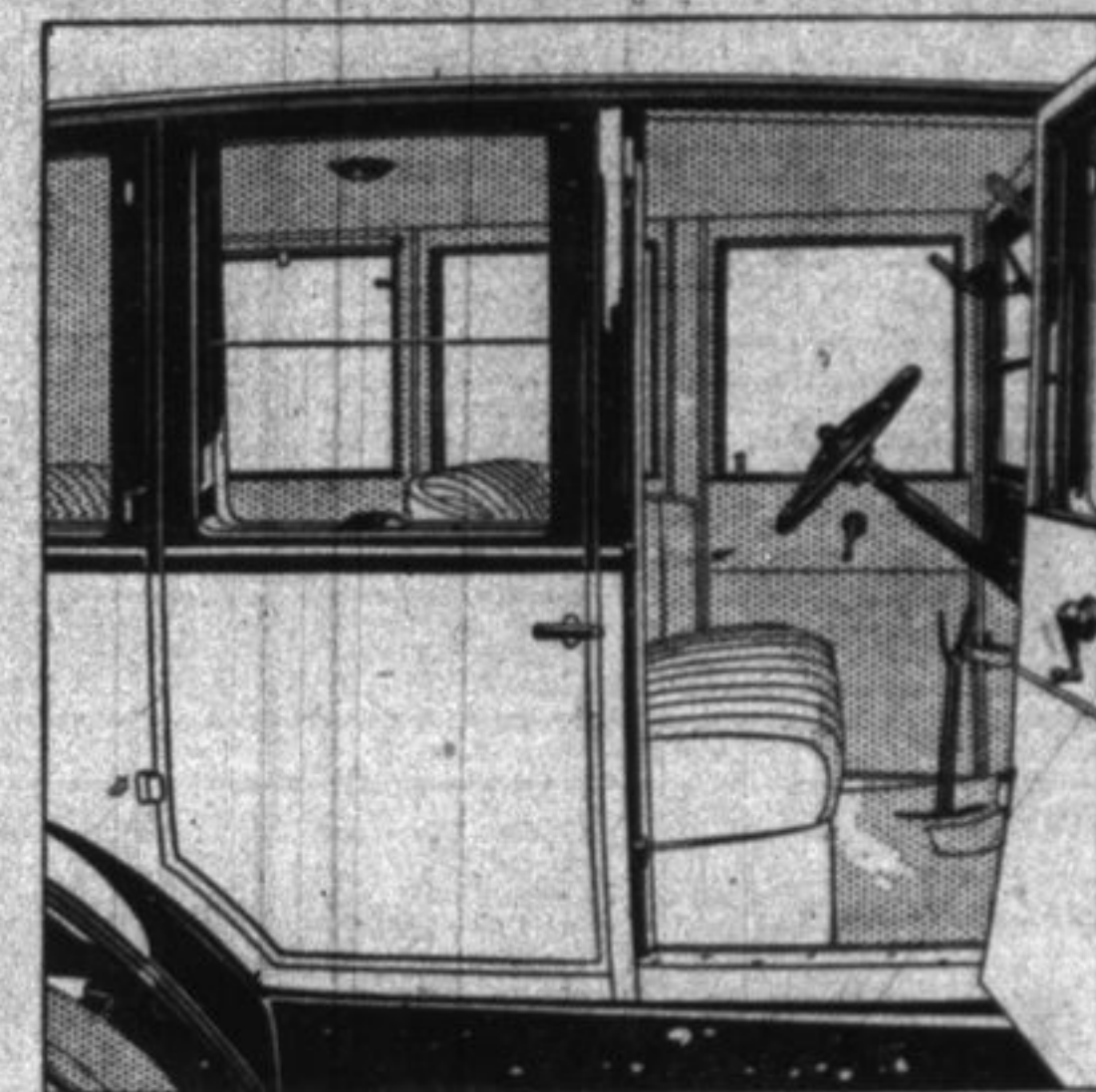

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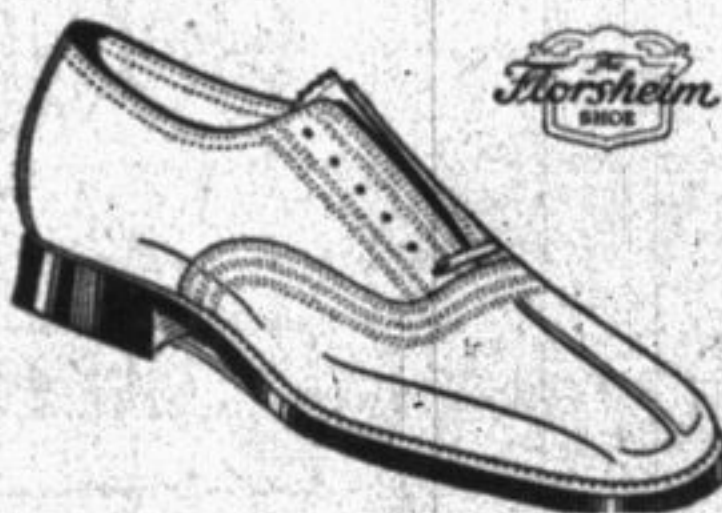
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
