That the warrant for collection of such assessment is in the hands of the undersigned.

The second installment one year hereafter and so on annually until all installments are paid.

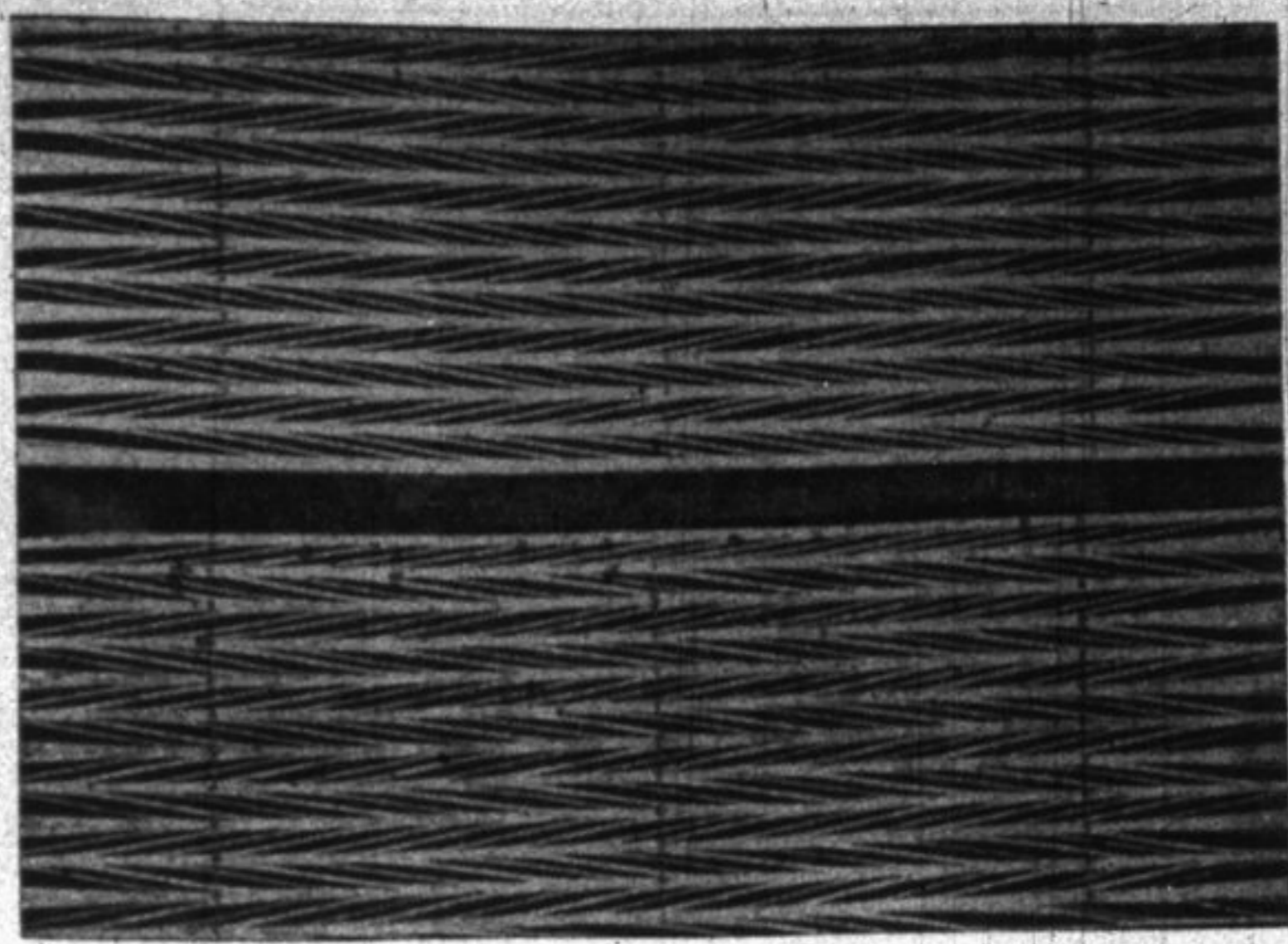

IDENTICAL panels with frames four feet high and eight feet long, constructed with sills and studs 7/8"x3 3/4" in. and studs placed 16 in. on centers, were prepared.

FRAME A had one side covered with 1/2"x6 in. dressed sheathing nailed at each stud with 8D nails, and the other side covered with common lath spaced 2 in. on centers and staggered in the usual way.

FRAME B was covered on both sides with Expanded Wood Lath sheets 8 ft. long and 16 in. wide, fastened at the juncture of each rib and stud with 6D nails.

In testing these panels the bottom sill was clamped to the base of testing machine and the pull applied to the top sill in the direction of its length.

Expanded Wood Lath, by this test, has been proven much stiffer than the old standard construction. But added to this advantage are its high insulating qualities and the much lower construction cost when used for either exterior stucco or interior plaster.

**ILLINOIS STADIUM**  
**IS GREAT MEMORIAL**

TO BE DEDICATED IN 1924

More Than 50,000 Seats and 4 Great Halls For Athletic Training; Built By Subscription

The contract price of the University of Illinois memorial stadium to date is \$1,661,000 which does not provide for the completion of the great halls beneath the two stands and other necessary work.

The stadium is being built by the contributions of 18,000 alumni and students and when completed will be presented to the university as their gift. It, therefore, is a gift to the state of Illinois. It will not be dedicated until completed in 1924.

The stadium is located on a 56-acre field southwest of the university armory and just south of the city limits of Champaign.

There are 17 miles of seats in the east and west stands with a capacity of 55,254. When more seats are needed, the south end can be enclosed, bringing the capacity to 92,000. Should more seats be necessary, the completion of the north end will increase the capacity to 120,000. It will be used the second time Nov. 10, when Illinois plays Wisconsin.

**Exterior Architecture**  
 The stadium exterior will be of red brick and white stone, a new note in stadium construction, which harmonizes with present and contemplated campus buildings.

The memory of Illinois men who gave their lives to their country in the world war will be honored by 100 columns of stone, each 24 feet high, which surmount each stand, forming two impressive colonades 424 feet long and 15 feet wide. These great promenades will overlook the campus and surrounding country at a height of 62 feet.

**Great Halls**  
 Beneath each stand will be a Great Hall, 414 feet long and 50 feet wide, free from columns. These will be used for basketball, handball and other intramural sports when completed.

There are two decks on each stand. The main floor starts at an elevation of one and one-half feet above the playing field and rises to 62 feet 2 1/2 inches. The upper deck or balcony starts at 57 feet 3 1/2 inches and rises to 110 feet 9 inches.

Each stand will be divided into nine sections. The lower half of the main floor will be reached by a series of ten practically level tunnels from the great halls. Access to all other levels of the main floor and balcony is to be obtained by ramps (inclined passages).

The upper half of the main floor is reached by a series of eight ramps, leading up to portals at an elevation of 39 feet 6 inches. The balconies are reached by a triple ramp in each end tower. These ramps encircle the towers and lead off to six equal distant points of the balcony tunnel at an elevation of 78 feet 9 inches and from there lead out to ten portals half way up the balcony.

**Thousands of Seats**  
 Out of the 55,254 seats in the east and west stands, 40,000 are within the limits of the goal posts—a far greater number than in any other stadium. None of the remaining seats are more than 54 feet past the posts.

There will be a quarter-mile track with two 220-yard straight-aways inside the Stadium but baseball will not be played there, the varsity diamond remaining on Illinois field.

The recreation field adjacent will contain tennis courts, baseball diamonds, fields for football, soccer, hockey, lacrosse and other sports and will be used by students not on varsity squads for intramural sports. Last year nearly 6000 students competed in these contests.

**Training Quarters**  
 Training quarters for varsity squads will be located in the lower stories of the north tower of the east stand, with lecture and training rooms, showers, lockers, coaches' rooms and emergency hospital. Freshman squads will be housed in the north tower of the west stand where visiting teams will be cared for also. A press box is provided in the center of the balcony on the west stand with accommodations for 180 persons. The box will be glass-shuttered, electric-lighted, and heated.

The south end of the Stadium is terraced and held by a 12 foot wall of brick. The north end is also enclosed by an artistic brick wall. There will be appropriate landscaping to set off the structure.
