It is a matter of gratification to the North Shore communities interested to know that active steps are being taken to interest the state highway department in the early completion of state bond issue route No. 22, the Barrington-Lake Forest road, which will open Green Bay road between Highland Park and Lake Forest by a direct paved highway on the west side of the railroad.
