#### R. C. WEBER DIES ON SUNDAY; LONG HERE

Old Resident At End of Life; Funeral Wednesday; The Family

Robert Carl Weber, well known resident of Highland Park for about 45 years, died Nov. 18, in the local hospital, where he had been for about a week and a half, following failing of health for some months. He was 69 years of age.

Mr. Weber was born in Germany and there married. He and his wife, who is living, came to America many years ago, and all of their children were born here. They have lived in and near Highland Park nearly half a century and the family has a host of friends by whom the death of Mr. Weber is deeply regretted. He was for many years an employe of the city and was highly esteemed everywhere. He was a member of the Modern Woodmen of America.

The children are Mrs. Theresa Foley, Nicholas A. Weber, Mrs. Catherine Pfeiffer, Mrs. Evalynne R. Berry, Frank J., Paul C., Robert E., and George J. Weber.

The funeral was held at 9 o'clock Wednesday morning at the Immaculate Conception church and burial was in the Sacred Heart cemetery.

#### URGING SMITH FOR ATTORNEY GENERAL

Friends of Lake County Prosecutor Want Him to Be Candidate

Throughout the state friends of State's Attorney A. V. Smith of Lake county are urging him to become a candidate for attorney general in the republican primary next April. It is reported that he probably will be a candidate if Attorney General Brundage is not and that if Brundage runs again Col. Smith Bradley will be a candidate for re-election as state's attorney. He was a lieutenant of the Rainbow division (Reilly's Bucks), and many ex-service men are boosting him for the state place.

Col. Smith came into prominence first by his drives against vice and prohibition law violators and later as a prosecutor in the trial of Gov. Small.

#### TWO HURT IN AUTO CRASH AT HIGHWOOD

Carl Shelberg of Deerfield, an employe of A. J. Johnson, contractor, suffered injuries to his head and shoulders in an automobile collision early Wednesday morning, at the corner of Prairie avenue and High street, in Highwood. A truck driven by Shelberg and a Ford coupe driven by William Gallagher of West Highland Park crashed together at the intersection causing the accident and badly damaging the coupe. Albert Borchardt, a brother of Mr. Mocoigni of Highwood, and who was riding with Shelberg, was slightly injured. Borchardt arrived here recently from Germany, according to Highwood witnesses of the accident.
