NORTH SHORE CITIES BAR TYPHOID OYSTER

24 CASES ARE REPORTED

In Evanston and Towns North; Sale of Specified Brand Of Mollusk Prohibited, in 46 Stores

The following statement was issued Tuesday by the Highland Park Board of Health:

A conference was held Monday afternoon at the Evanston Department of Health to discuss the present typhoid epidemic. The following members were present: Dr. H. B. Switzer, bacteriologist, Bureau of Chemistry, U. S. Dept. of Agriculture, Chicago, Ill.; Dr. E. E. Moore, commissioner of health, Wilmette; Dr. C. O. Schneider, commissioner of health, Winnetka; Dr. D. W. Rogers, Dr. G. Q. Grady, Highland Park; Dr. S. S. Winner, chief of District Health Superintendent, State Dept. of Public Health; Dr. C. T. Roome, commissioner of health, Evanston.

Infected Oyster Cause
After a careful survey of the condition in Evanston and the North Shore towns represented, and a thorough investigation of individual cases so far reported, it was the unanimous opinion of those present that the evidence presented indicated raw oysters of a certain source as the cause of the epidemic. It was therefore ordered that the further sale of oysters from this source be at once prohibited. Every store or market handling this brand was at once given this order.

The number of stores so notified were: Evanston, 24; Wilmette, 7; Gross Point, 3; Kenilworth, 1; Glenco, 4; Winnetka, 6; Highland Park, 1.

Cases Reported
The number of cases of typhoid fever and suspicious cases to date are: Evanston, 11; Wilmette, 4; Gross Point, 1; Hubbard Woods and Winnetka, 8.

All contacts living on the premises where there is a case of typhoid fever must be immunized against the disease if allowed to pursue their occupation. If engaged in handling food, they are quarantined, or must be removed from the premises. All nurses, attendants, etc., at hospitals coming in contact with cases of typhoid fever must be immunized. No visitors are allowed unless immunized.

Effective Preventative
The attention of the public is called to the remarkable effectiveness of typhoid vaccination as a preventative

of typhoid fever. During the world war, typhoid fever was practically banished from the United States army through universal vaccination. The procedure is so very simple and the results so effective that its general employment is warmly recommended, especially in view of the present possibilities of typhoid infection. People who travel or are contemplating visits away from home should especially not neglect this precaution.

CHICAGO BLUES EASY FOR HIGHWOOD TEAM

Highwood completely outclassed the Chicago Blues at Highwood field Sunday. The score was 25 to 0. Oyer and Lauridsen tore through the line at will while Shannon displayed

his wares on open field running, throwing in a tackle smash for several yards once in a while.

Bolans coaching worked wonders with the local boys. They displayed a variety of plays and with only one or two fumbles all plays went off with clockwork precision.

The first quarter the Blues kicked to Shannon who ran 90 yards for a touchdown, the referee ruled he was out of bounds on the 20 yard line.

Oyer made the first touchdown, gaining 5 and 10 yards through the tackle time and again, finally putting it over on a fine line plunge for about 8 yards.

Lauridsen played his usual fine game at full. He was injured in the second quarter but refused to give up.

In the third and fourth quarters the Blues completed some forward

passes but failed to follow them up although Highwood's second string line was performing at the time.

The crowning feat of the game was Shannon's long end run around the right end, with perfect interference Shannon cleared the end and dodged through the entire Blue team for a 40 yard touchdown.
