CAMPAIGN ISSUES ARE CRYSTALIZING

TO DESTROY OR UPBUILD
Constructive and Destructive Forces Likely to Come to Grips; Time to Hold Proved Values

Enough may be gathered from the tendencies of the time to warrant the belief that the campaign of 1924 will be fundamentally a contest between constructive and destructive political forces, says the National Republican. The World war necessarily brought about vastly the greatest organization of humanity for destruction history has known. The spirit of destruction it loosed is still the greatest and most menacing factor in civilization. Abroad this spirit has wrecked some nations and threatens the stability of others. Here ordered liberty, because of the character of our people and of their institutions, is more secure than elsewhere. But it is challenged by demagogues and doctrines who are far more active in attacking than are the constructive forces of the country in defending the foundations which underlie national security and prosperity.

Different Times; Different Policies.
There are times in the history of nations when the need is change, innovation, even revolution. There are other times when the manifest duty of a people is to defend time-tried institutions and policies against experimental proposals of departure. With the world in turmoil, with most of it in the shadow of depression, with the safety of civilization itself in question, thoughtful men and women will seek security and permanency in government, holding fast to that which is good rather than risking all by accepting the leadership of theorists and opportunists who propose to tear down the existing structure on the unsupported promise that they can build a better one.

The radical, destructive forces of this country are expending ten times as much in money and effort to convert the American people to their way of thinking, than the constructive forces of the country are expending in creating a sound, wholesome, constructive public opinion which will enable the Republican party, next year to meet the powerful offensive of the radical forces preparing to rally under Democratic party leadership at that time; a leadership which it seems certain will be willing to cater to any sentiment, however inconsistent with the traditional principle of Democracy that may promise success at the polls, in 1924.

Danger Confronting
The danger we confront in this country is not in the open communism, bolshevism or socialism of red agitators honest enough to fly their own flag and confess their own cause. It is in the near socialists, near communists and unreasoning radicals generally, camouflaged under other names and led by time-serving politicians whose love of country is less than their love of place and power, who are willing to advocate or compromise with anything, whatever its ultimate effect which will for the time being gain them votes. This is the combination Republicanism must, in all probability, confront next year, and under conditions favorable to the growth of such a movement, we must prepare to educate, agitate and organize in behalf of the constructive cause for which Republicanism stands.

The mails of this country are flooded with radical papers, books and pamphlets, reaching many millions of readers, with orators and organizers preaching the gospel of destruction. European radicalism is ceaselessly, intelligently and effectively active as against constructive Americanism.

No Parallel
In the history of no other country in the world is there a parallel for the success achieved by the Republican administration at Washington in national reconstruction following the World war cataclysm. Stability is the watchword of the government at Washington. It may well be the rallying cry of Republicanism in the campaign of 1924. It is the duty of Republicans not only as party men and women but as patriotic citizens of the richest and the most prosperous, the freest and the most secure nation in the world to save this republic from the assaults of those who would abandon the ideals and institutions which have made us what we are for those which have left disaster in their wake beyond the seas. For this is what the campaign of 1924 means, and without waiting for 1924, Republicans should be waging it.

DR. CHIDESTER IS AUTHOR OF CREED
Waukegan Presbyterian Minister Writes Prayer for Christians for 1923
Samuel Willis Chidester, D.D., pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Waukegan, has written a new prayer for use of modern people which he calls a "Creed for Christians, 1923." The new creed, taking religious sentiments of the old days, and working them into the sentiments of today, is written in the metre of the "Apostle's Creed" and includes the spirit of that prayer as

well as the desires and petitions of the present day seeker after the truth. The new creed follows:
"I believe in God the Father Almighty, Maker of Heaven and Earth; and in Jesus Christ His Son, our Lord; Who is the Way, the Truth, and the Life; Who was made in the likeness of men; fulfilled all Righteousness; was obedient unto death; and is become Judge of the Quick and the Dead. I believe in the Love of God; the Holy Spirit of God; the Regeneration of the Soul; the Holy Invisible Church; the Oneness of all Believers; the Brotherhood of Man; the Kingdom of God on earth; and the Life Everlasting. Amen."

The prayer was distributed to the members of the church, printed on the little folders that are given out each Sunday morning announcing the services for the day and special announcements for the week.

PUBLIC SERVICE CO. EMPLOYEES' DINNER
One Held Last Week in Chicago And Second to Be Tuesday, Dec. 18
