FUEL FIRMS PLAN LARGE FACILITIES
Herman Denzel Buys Old Brickyard Property; Siljstrom Gets New Location

Highland Park fuel concerns like the rest of the town are growing and planning new quarters to accommodate increasing business. Herman Denzel has purchased the old brickyard property of 20 acres near Blodgett and is repairing the buildings and will lease them to tenants. The Highland Park Fuel Co. eventually will remove to that location, but probably not for several years, Mr. Denzel says. In the meantime the territory in that section will be served from the new location, and already several carloads of material are being handled there weekly. Other improvements are in prospect. Frank Siljstrom is planning expansion and is having graded a new site on St. John's avenue, east of the railroad, where he expects to remove his business location in due time. A switch track and other improvements are under way at the new site.

ORIGINATES SEVERAL NEW IMPROVEMENTS

nation of local improvement for a sanitary sewer extension in Ravinia court, to cost, it is estimated, \$2832.00.
Extensive Sewer Planned
Commissioner Card moved origination of local improvement to consist of a sanitary sewer extension in Brownville road, Lincolnwood road, Manor court, Pierce road, Braeside road and St. Johns avenue, the estimated cost being \$18,143.00.
Resolutions advancing these projects and providing for public hearings on all of them on Friday, Dec. 28, at 5 p. m., at the city hall, were adopted.
Winds & Marsh, city engineers, submitted estimate No. 1 and final by Contractor Charles M. Porter Co., for work and material in construction of a sanitary sewer in St. Johns avenue, showing that the amount due the contractors was \$4206.68. Motions were made providing for issue of a voucher to the Porter Co. for that amount and for proper recording of the transaction.
The engineers also submitted estimate No. 1 and final for work and material on contract by Douglas McNeill on construction of water main extension in Maple avenue, showing amount due the contractor was \$1347.72. Motions were carried authorizing issue of the necessary voucher and for recording of the transaction.
Commissioner Cheney moved final acceptance of the Glencoe avenue water main, built at a cost of \$1736.00. Commissioner Preston moved final acceptance of the Maple avenue water main extension, the cost being \$1669.00. Commissioner Gourley moved final acceptance of the St. Johns avenue sanitary sewer extension, the cost being \$5209.00. All these motions prevailed.
Commissioner Cheney moved approval of a plat entitled Sunset Manor, lying east of the 85-foot right of way of the Public Service company of Northern Illinois and east of the Deerfield road. The motion carried.
Commissioner Gourley moved tentative approval of a plat entitled Jacob B. Schieck's Re-Sub. of Schieck's subdivision and lot 5, block 4, Ridge-wood Park sub., in the southeast quarter of Section 26, township 43, north, range 12 east of the Third Principal Meridian. Carried.
Commissioner Preston moved that Paul Borchardt be granted a permit to build a stucco building, not more than 800 square feet in area and not more than 20 feet in height, as provided under the building code. The motion carried.

YOUNG ITALIAN IN SUICIDE ATTEMPT
Mentally deranged from the effects of his terrible experiences during four years of service in the Italian army in the World War, Blazio Rodolfo, 24, laborer here for several months, attempted to take his life Monday night in his room at the Central hotel.
He fired two shots from a .22-caliber pistol into his body in the region of the heart, but missing that vital organ. He was taken to the local hospital, where he was reported somewhat improved yesterday. His recovery is considered possible, but his condition is critical, as he suffered much loss of blood before the police were able to get him out of the room, the door of which was locked and had to be broken open.

NEW SEPTIC TANK IS GLASS-ENCLOSED
