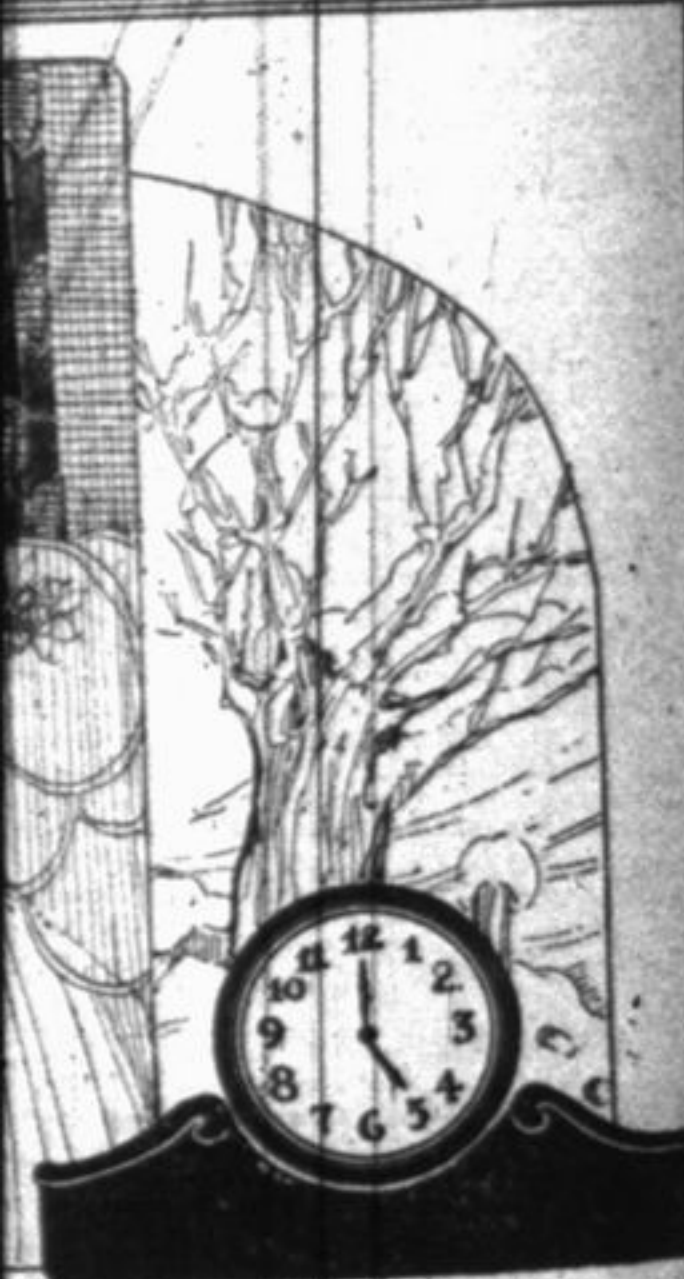

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that bids will be received for the construction of a reinforced concrete pavement in Glencoe Avenue from Lincoln Avenue to Green Bay Road and in Gray Avenue from Ridgewood Drive to Glencoe Avenue, all in the City of Highland Park, Lake County, Illinois, as a whole in accordance with the ordinance therefor.

Said bids will be received by the Council at its office in the City Hall, Highland Park, Illinois, until 5:00 o'clock P. M. on the 18th day of January, 1924, at which time and place they will be publicly opened and read.

The specifications and blank proposals will be furnished at the office of the City Clerk in the City Hall of said City.

The contractor will be paid in bonds, which bonds will draw interest at the rate of six (6) per cent per annum.

The successful bidder for the construction of said improvement will be required to enter into bond in a sum equal to one-third of the amount of his or their bid with sureties to be approved by the President of the Council when entering into the contract for the construction of said improvement. All proposals or bids must be accompanied by a certified check pay-

able to the President of the Council of the City of Highland Park for the sum of not less than ten (10) per cent of the aggregate of the proposal.

Said proposal must be delivered to the President of the Council in open session of said Council at the time and place fixed herein for the opening of the same.

No proposal or bid will be considered unless accompanied by check herein provided.

The Council reserves the right to reject any or all bids if they deem it best for the public good.

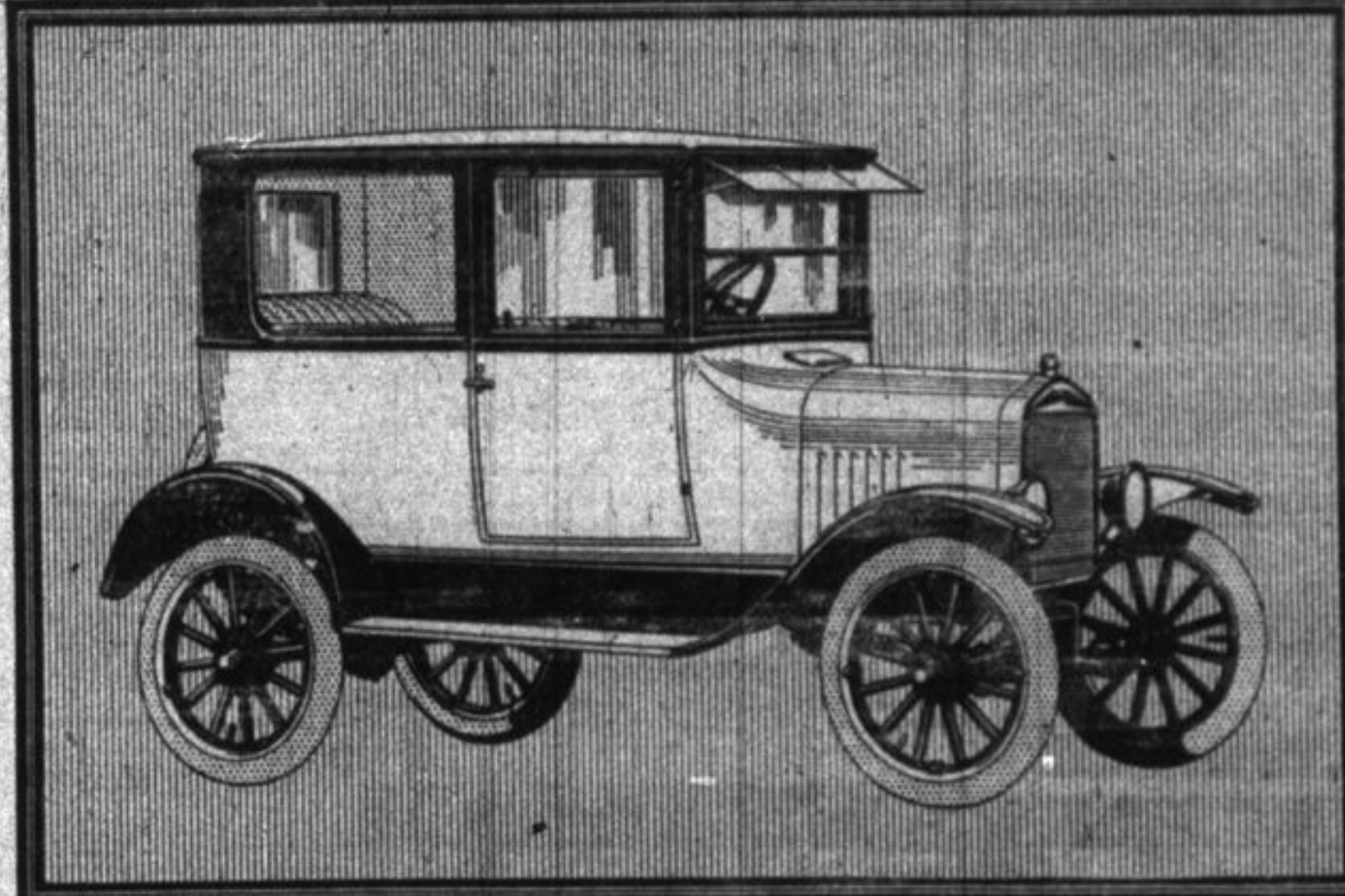
