Distinguished Speakers at Meeting Held on January 10; All Day Session Is Held

USE NEW APPARATUS ON DRAINAGE DITCH

Work to Be Pushed by Contractor on Skokie Job; Expect to Finish in May

Work on the construction of the drainage ditch being constructed in the East Skokie Drainage District west of Highland Park will be resumed within a few days and, unless extreme weather conditions prevent, will be pushed to completion during the coming winter months.

The contractor, Nelson J. Cole, of Greenville, Ohio, has just purchased and had shipped to Highland Park, a new dredging outfit more suitable to the character of work to be done in this district. Contrary to expectations when he entered upon the work, much quicksand was encountered and this, together with the large amount of rain-fall, has made it impossible to prosecute the work satisfactorily with the dredging outfit with which the work was started. It is hoped, with the new machine which has been ordered, that the work will be completed not later than the first of next May.

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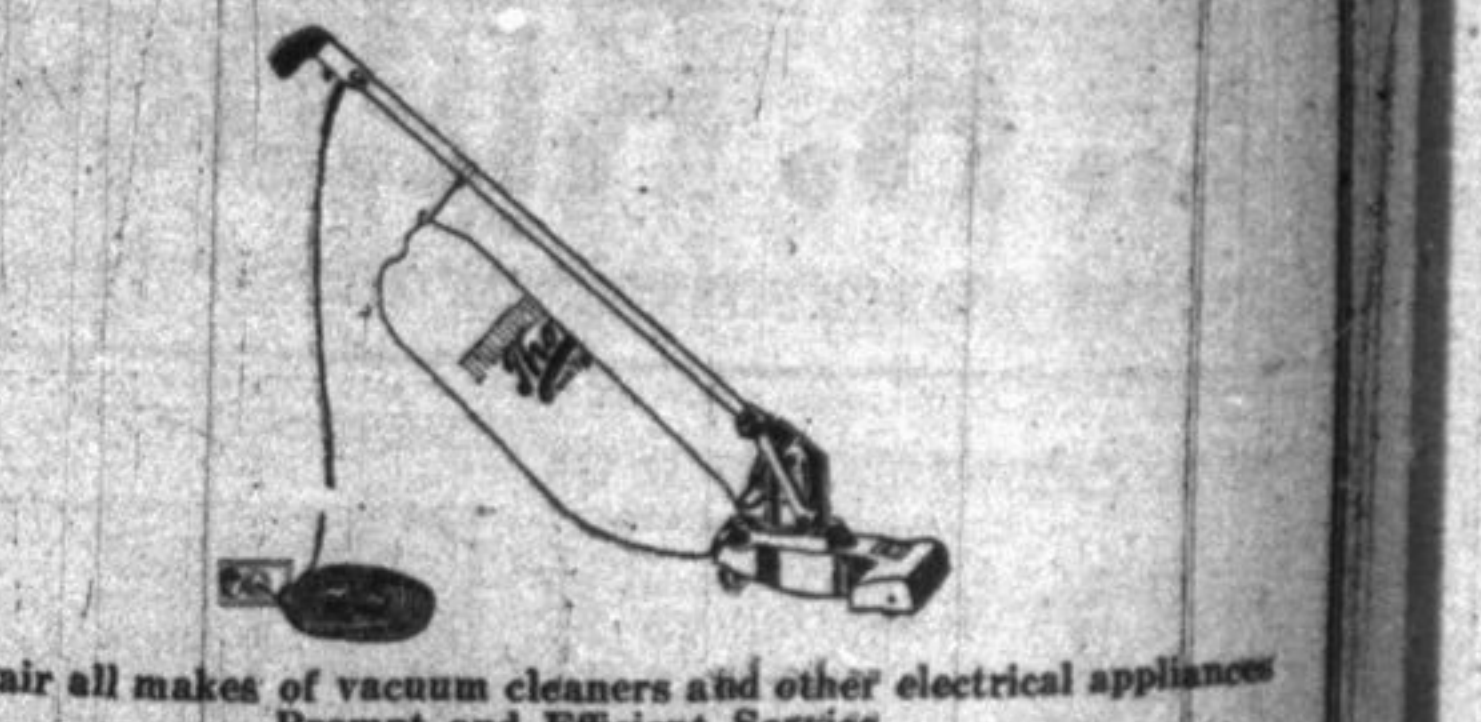
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
