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IDAHO'S EARLY DAYS TELL THRILLING STORY

FROM SALT LAKE PAPER

Ed. V. Price, Prominent Chicago Tailor and Highland Park Resident, Was Stage Driver

The following article appeared in the Salt Lake Tribune of Sunday, January 6th and was written by Henry H. Graham. The article refers to one of our Highland Park residents Mr. E. V. Price:

It is always interesting to turn back the pages of time and review what has gone before. Pioneer days, regardless of what field this period refers to, are filled with hardship, uncertainty and privation. Yet to those founders of new things, whether in the realm of medicine, land, or what not, a certain amount of joy is derived from sitting back at the close of an eventful life and surveying the glories that are gone.

That is, perhaps, nothing which produces quite the thrill felt in the migration to a new country. The uncertainty of what the future holds in store for the settlers, coupled with the making of new friends, lends an atmosphere of charm to the undertaking.

Southern Idaho was settled by a people who upheld all the best traditions of the race. They were a God-fearing, wide-awake clan. The men were the vital type—those who do things; the women were not far behind them in mental and physical courage.

Stage drivers recount interesting incidents of their work in the pioneer period. The holdups, races with Indians and kindred events find a parallel in the better known scenes which made up the life of the gold miner of '49 and the years that followed.

Wherever the law is least efficient—there will you find proportionately the greater number of bandits and robbers. Authorities were none too common in the Gem state then and much gold and other booty fell to the preying hands which terrorized the traveler who went by stage.

Many of the men who drove stages along about 1880 have risen to top-notch positions in the world of business. Some of them stayed west, but others wandered east and became established in one of the vocations which led them up the ladder of fame, wealth and prestige.

Reviews Old Scenes One of the latter is Ed V. Price, now owner of a clothing company at Chicago which bears his name. Price was for a years a driver in Idaho and finds it a pleasure to reminisce with old friends the things that took place before the auto displaced the horse as a means of travel.

A year or two ago Price was in Twin Falls. He had come in his magnificent new car, quite a contrast to the weather-beaten stage he used to handle.

The writer conversed with Price for a half hour, finding him courteous and inclined to talk of old times, comparing them with the present and noting the marked changes which have taken place in that short interval.

Price showed much interest in the development of the Twin Falls tract, southern Idaho, and, in fact, the whole intermountain region. The west is still dear to his heart, for it was there that he spent a part of his early life.
