The class will be limited

Registration should be made before January 8 to Miss Helen Parker, museum instructor, Art Institute, Mr. Harshbarger's subjects are as follows: January 17, composition in painting; January 24, technique in painting; January 31, evolution of landscape painting; February 7, evolution of portrait painting; February 14, modern painting.

Clocks that never need winding are being installed in numerous business places and residences in Highland Park by the Western Union Telegraph company. C. J. Heath, representative of the company was in town today and called at the Press office. He plans to furnish the city with Western Union standing naval observatory time through the medium of these clocks, which are regulated every hour by telegraph and can always be depended on to help you catch your train and fill your engagements and orders on time. The time furnished is obtained from the naval observatory at Washington, D. C., and Mare Island, Cal., and is official standard time of the United States. The Western Union installs the clocks and takes care of them.

April 30th to May 6th are the dates set for the National Convention of the Young Women's Christian Association next spring. The hotel Commodore has been chosen as the convention headquarters. Many visitors of importance from other countries are expected.

In the call to the convention just issued by Mrs. Robert E. Speer, President of the National Board, she says in part: "It has become increasingly evident that the nations of the world cannot study their common problems except as they meet through carefully chosen representatives, to face and study the issues that affect their well being. Our age will be known in history as an age of conferences. It is therefore not as conforming to law, nor as following tradition, that the Young Women's Christian Association of the United States of America are once more called to meet in convention. It is because such a meeting is vital to our existence that we are to expend this time, this effort and this money."

The nation entrusts the organization with material resources and asks that gifts be returned through its young women. This work entrusted to us can only be done as we do it in union with the limitless power of our Lord Jesus Christ.

The rapid growth and the present scope of the national work is briefly outlined. The present budgets of American Y. W. C. A. work total over twenty-five million yearly. Foreign work supported by American Association funds are included in these total figures. Founded in 1906 from a union of two organizations dating back to 1871 respectively the national membership has grown from less than 150,000 girls and young women to over 525,000. Over 2,000 delegates representing 1,046 associations are expected to attend the convention.

The National Board is the executive body of the affiliated American associations. Its present officers are: Mrs. Robert E. Speer, Pres.; Mrs. John French, Chairman Executive Committee; Miss Clara S. Reed, First Vice-President; Mrs. John D. Rockefeller, Jr., Second Vice-President; Miss Katherine Lambert, Secretary; Mrs. Samuel J. Broadwell, Treasurer; Miss Margaret P. Mead, Assistant Treasurer.

The last two conventions were held in Hot Springs, Arkansas in 1922 and in Cleveland, Ohio in 1920.

During the month of December the Y. W. C. A. had 20 adult club meetings, 4 vesper services, 5 committee meetings, 28 educational classes, 6 people were located in rooms other than our own. More than a thousand people used the headquarters in some capacity.

A new club, composed of the young Business women of Highland Park, has been organized. This group is known as the B "Y's" club. All young Business women are invited to become members and take part in the program and activities.

The Friendship and Astor clubs have their regular meetings tonight. The girl Reserve groups are steadily growing. Any girl, who is twelve or above will find a place in our clubs.

The Busy Bees are giving much time to the rehearsals of their "peppy" little comedy, which they will give on Thursday evening, Jan. 24. There is a limit to the sale of tickets so get them early.
