## DEERFIELD CHURCH SUNDAY NIGHT TALKS

### Senator McCormick Draws Big Audience; Speakers for Coming Sundays

## TO TAKE VOTE ON ANNEXATION PLAN

### SPECIAL ELECTION SOON

### Petitions of Majorities of Deerfield Owners and Voters Presented to Council; Other Business

With signatures of a majority of the property owners and of the voters of Deerfield township obtained to petitions to have the portion of that township outside Highland Park annexed to this city, the council at its regular meeting last Friday evening voted to submit the proposition to annex this territory to a vote of the people at a special election. The date of the election was not fixed, but it is planned to hold it early in March.

The petitions presented to the council bear the signatures of good-sized majorities of both property owners and voters. The territory includes all that portion of the township now outside the city of Highland Park, with the exception of the city of Highwood.

At this session of the council there were present Commissioners Cheney, Preston, Card and Gourley. Mayor Hastings was absent.

The property owners' petition for improvement of St. Johns avenue, from Central avenue to Elm place was referred to the commissioner of streets and public improvements.

### Bids Presented

Pursuant to a resolution heretofore adopted and publications of Jan. 3 and 10, 1924, the following bids were presented to the council for construction of a reinforced concrete pavement in Glencoe avenue, from Lincoln avenue to Green Bay road, and in Gray avenue from Ridgeway drive to Glencoe avenue: H. G. Goelitz, \$29,792.96; Highway Construction Co., \$28,252.30; E. A. Meyer Construction Co., \$25,526.80; John A. McCarty & Co., \$29,483.65. Commissioner Preston's motion that the bids be filed for public inspection, according to ordinance, carried.

Bids also were presented for the extension and opening of Dean avenue from the south line of Roger Williams avenue to a line running 136 feet easterly from and parallel to the easterly line of the right of way of the Chicago & Northwestern railroad, and improvement of the same. The bids were: H. G. Goelitz, \$5757.50; Highway Construction Co., \$5632.75; E. A. Meyer Construction Co., \$5093.75. The bids were filed for public inspection.

Petitions for the annexation to the city of the remainder of Deerfield township were presented at this juncture, and a motion by Commissioner Preston that they be received and filed and a special election called for the purpose of submitting the question to the voters of the city was passed.

Commissioner Gourley moved that the city clerk be directed to notify Edw. Norrien that his barn situated in Gray avenue must be removed within 60 days. The motion prevailed.

### Approve Plats

On motion of Commissioner Cagel tentative approval was accorded a plat entitled "Proposed Bob O'Link Vista, being a subdivision in the northwest quarter of Section 26-43-12."

Commissioner Gourley moved approval of a plat entitled "Arthur Dunas' Ravinia Terrace," being a subdivision of the southwest quarter of Section 36-43-12, east of the third principal meridian. The motion was carried.

On motion of Commissioner Preston the council approved the plat of dedication for street purposes of those parts of Lots 1 and 2 of Deerfield Villa, being a subdivision in Section 27-43-12.

On motion of Commissioner Card approval was accorded the plat entitled "First Addition to Deerfield Villa," being a subdivision of Lots 33 to 38, inclusive, in Deerfield Villa subdivision of Section 27-43-12.

On motion of Commissioner Gourley an ordinance was adopted providing for a Board of Local Improvements of the City of Highland Park.

## COURSES OFFERED TO NEW STUDENTS

### DEERFIELD-SHIELDS HIGH

### Schedules of Studies Which May Be Started by Pupils Who Enter at Beginning of New Semester

Many interesting courses are to be offered to the beginning student when the second semester opens Jan. 28. In almost every department new courses are offered.

Although a student may take any study he desires, five courses are outlined which start this semester.

The college preparatory course is intended to prepare the student who desires to continue his education for entrance into college.

Two of the remaining courses are offered to boys and two to girls. The boys can take either an Industrial Course, or a Business Course with Industrial Arts. The girls can take a Household Arts course, or a Business course with some Household Arts.

Schedules of the courses which are opened to the new students are listed at the end of this article.

After being out of school for some time there are many students who want to come back to earn their diploma or take one or two subjects. Provision has been made for this class of students, and every department has opened courses.

Every semester of the four years of English has open classes for these students. A prospective student who has dropped school may start where he left off.

In the foreign language department only beginning Latin and Caesar are open, excepting to students who have had some of this work before.

### Science Department

The department of Science is closed except to students who are eligible to join a mid-year class.

There is a beginning class in Ancient History, Commercial Arithmetic

## STOCK CONCERT TO OPEN AUDITORIUM

### PLAN TO RAISE \$5,000.00

### That Sum Yet Needed to Complete Building for Dedication; Committees Working

Fredrick Stock, world famous orchestra conductor, with his Civic orchestra, will be the notable feature of the formal opening of the new Elm Place auditorium in April, if plans to raise \$5,000 necessary to complete work yet to be done on the auditorium are successful.

The committee in charge of the building is making every effort to insure this event, which is the final concert in the series being given by the civic music association of the Deerfield-Shields township scheduled for April 13, the second Sunday in that month, and a committee of women has undertaken to raise the \$5,000 still needed to complete the work at present planned on the building. The Civic Music Series committee, headed by Mrs. George Lytton, is co-operating in this project to make the opening of the new auditorium one of the most memorable public events in the history of Highland Park.

### Ideal Conditions

The new Elm Place auditorium, now nearing completion, will be an ideal place for a concert of this kind. It will have a roomy stage, graduated seats, and acoustical corrections are being made adequate to the requirements of a great symphony orchestra, so that every possible advantage may be obtained from such a high class musical performance. The appearance of Director Frederick Stock and his Civic orchestra in the Fourth number of the Civic Music series will mark its dedication to public uses in a fitting and memorable way.
