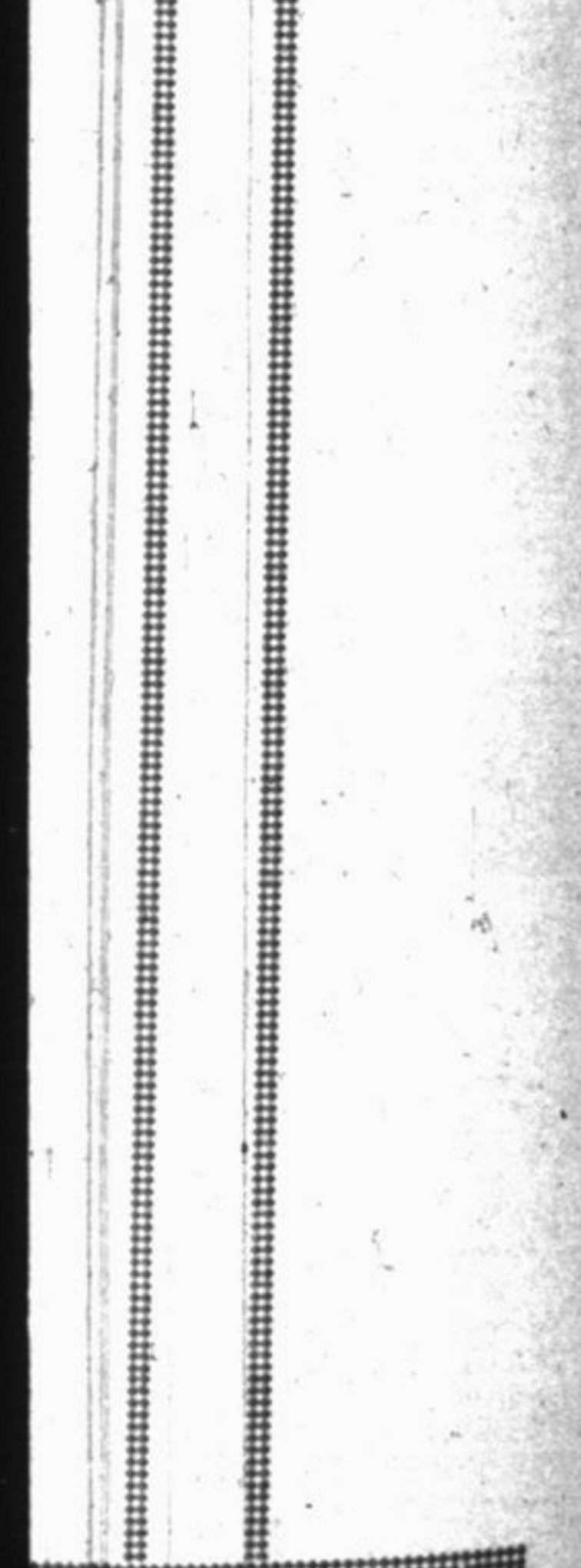
FORGETTING OLD YEAR GRUDGES: BEGIN ANEW

GAME SANCTUARIES PLANNED IN STATE

FISH HATCHERIES ALSO

Chief of Division Having This In Charge Reports Extensive Projects; Many Bass Ponds

Fish, bird and game sanctuaries and hatcheries are to be established in all sections of Illinois under plans now being developed by the state division of game and fish, according to William J. Stratton of Ingleside, chief of the division. Provision has been made for the establishment of three fish hatcheries and an indefinite number of bass ponds, of fish sanctuaries. Locations for the latter are now being surveyed by the division. One of the hatcheries is to be located in the northern part of the state, probably in the vicinity of Rockford, while a second will be developed in the central part of the state and a third in southern Illinois.

Plan Sanctuaries
The bass ponds will be distributed in all sections and will be stocked and cared for by the state, according to Mr. Stratton. These will usually include considerable surrounding land, for bird and animal sanctuaries.

The division has arranged to purchase all of the entire output of one of the largest wild game farms in the state for use in artificial restocking. Pheasants and other wild birds will be introduced. The state has been restocking Illinois rivers with fish for some time and with the help of the preserves to be established, and those already in operation, a permanent supply will be assured, Mr. Stratton said.

Eventually the division hopes to add to its preserves a large section on the Illinois river to be used as a sanctuary for wild duck and other migratory birds.

Conservation Expert Head
N. R. Huff, a well-known authority on conservation, has been employed by the department to assist in carrying out its conservation plans. He is at present in the southern part of the state, making a survey of the possibilities there and giving talks on conservation.

EXPERT EXPLAINS GEOLOGICAL FACTS

Professor Tells of Explorations Over Eighteen Years

In a paper delivered before the Geological Section of the American Association for the Advancement of Science last week at Cincinnati, Professor W. G. Waterman of Northwestern university described the results of observations extending over a period of eighteen years. His first visit was made with Dr. Sperry in 1905. Dr. Sperry was the pioneer in the southern part of what is now Glacier National park and the discoverer of Sperry Glacier. Professor Waterman spent three weeks with him in camp on the edge of Sperry Glacier, which was thoroughly studied and photographed. Comparing these studies with those made last summer, it was discovered that the glacier had lost one quarter or perhaps even one third of its ice in the eighteen years. One spot where the identification of land-marks was complete, the front of the ice had retreated three hundred yards, and a huge ridge of moraine clay and gravel had been completely freed from its cover of ice. In the center of the glacier the surface of the ice had been lowered 50 to 100 feet.

Other evidences showed that this great retreat had taken place almost entirely in the past five years. A photograph taken in 1919 showed the ice front in about the same place as in 1905, and the surface of the glacier very similar in appearance to that of the earlier date. Moreover a stretch of the underlying rock had been exposed and instead of being covered by the mantle of clay and gravel which is the result of slow retreat, it was almost bare of such deposits. A striking ice cave seventy-five feet long and thirty feet wide was also found at this spot.

If this rapid retreat should continue, Sperry Glacier would almost disappear in another twenty or twenty-five years. Fortunately this retreat seems to be the result of the hot, dry seasons of the past five years. It is probable that this dry season is nearly over and that increased precipitation in subsequent years will overcome at least in large part this excessive retreat.
