The Waukegan Lions Club a branch of the International Lions Club, was organized this noon at a meeting held at the Arlington Hotel.

Coal dealers of Waukegan have started a war on prices of both soft and hard coal which threatens to bring about conditions that should make the consumers happy if any thing will.

William Riley, 67 years old, a resident of Waukegan for many years died last week at the Lake County general hospital where he had been a patient for the last two or three years. He was 67 years of age.

With her rudder swept away by a small submerged iceberg and a hole stoved in her hull, the freighter Sheboygan, owned by the Hill Steamship company, of Waukegan was towed into port at Muskegon, Mich., last week and her crew of thirty-seven men taken off.

A round-up of all the boys and girls of Waukegan who are under 17 years of age, and who are not now attending either the grade, high or vocational education schools, has been started by C. L. Jordan, director of vocational education of the Waukegan high district.

Fire which started with a defective oil stove in the home of W. W. Blythe Winthrop Harbor, last week completely destroyed two homes and badly damaged a third before the flames were halted by the work of the Kenosha fire department and the pump truck from Zion City.

Lake County reported nine of the 331 new cases of scarlet fever in the state reported during the week of Jan. 20-26 to the state department of public health, according to a dispatch

from Springfield. In this respect Lake County reported more cases of this disease than any other county in the state with the exception of Cook, Kane and Macon counties.

Five hundred guests who attended the annual banquet of the Waukegan-North Chicago chamber of commerce last week were rewarded by one of the best programs ever presented in the history of the organization.

Carl Garbrecht, 29 years old, was found mangled and dead in the south yard tracks of the American Steel & Wire company tracks at Waukegan last week. It is thought he met his death under the wheels of a big locomotive crane, on which he was a switchman.

**NEW OVERTON NOVEL
IS CLEVER ROMANCE**

Interesting Facts Regarding It
Are Given; Many Thrilling
Features

On the word of the author, Grant Overton's new novel is a very much seasoned article, having been written in 1920 and having been seasoned for over three years before publication. It was sold as a magazine serial on completion and was to have appeared in "Romance," which, however, expired with the story unused. On another occasion Charles Henson Towne, then editor of the "Metropolitan," read the novel and liked it, and had his hand poised to write a liberal check when the "Metropolitan" changed hands and all plans were necessarily cancelled. As the serial rights had been bought and paid for, there was nothing to do but wait for the release of the story for book publication—which has finally happened.

The Thousand and First Night is one of those tales in which the direct action takes place all in one night, among three characters assembled in an old Long Island manorhouse. The implication of the story, however, goes far beyond this restricted place and time—to Tangier in Africa, in one direction, and to the loss of a ship in mid-Pacific in another.

A curious detail is that the story implies a circumnavigation of the globe, just completed by one of the characters, and done to commemorate the 400th anniversary of Magellan's circumnavigation of the earth (1522). It so happens that just as the book is being published plans for such a flight around the world are actively under way.

**PUBLIC DEBT IS CUT
OVER TWO BILLIONS**

Big Gain in Finances Made By
Republican Administration
in 2 Years

The interest-bearing public debt of the United States on February 28, 1921, was \$24,051,648,728.

The interest-bearing public debt on December 31, 1923, after the Republican administration had been in power two years and nine months was \$21,640,713,231.

This makes a decrease under the Republican administration of \$2,400,935,497.

Each billion dollars of principal paid off saves the taxpayers of the country \$45,000,000 a year in interest, so that the saving in interest due to the fiscal policy of the Republican administration this year amounts to over \$100,000,000, as compared with the interest charges when the Republican party took charge of affairs in March, 1921.
