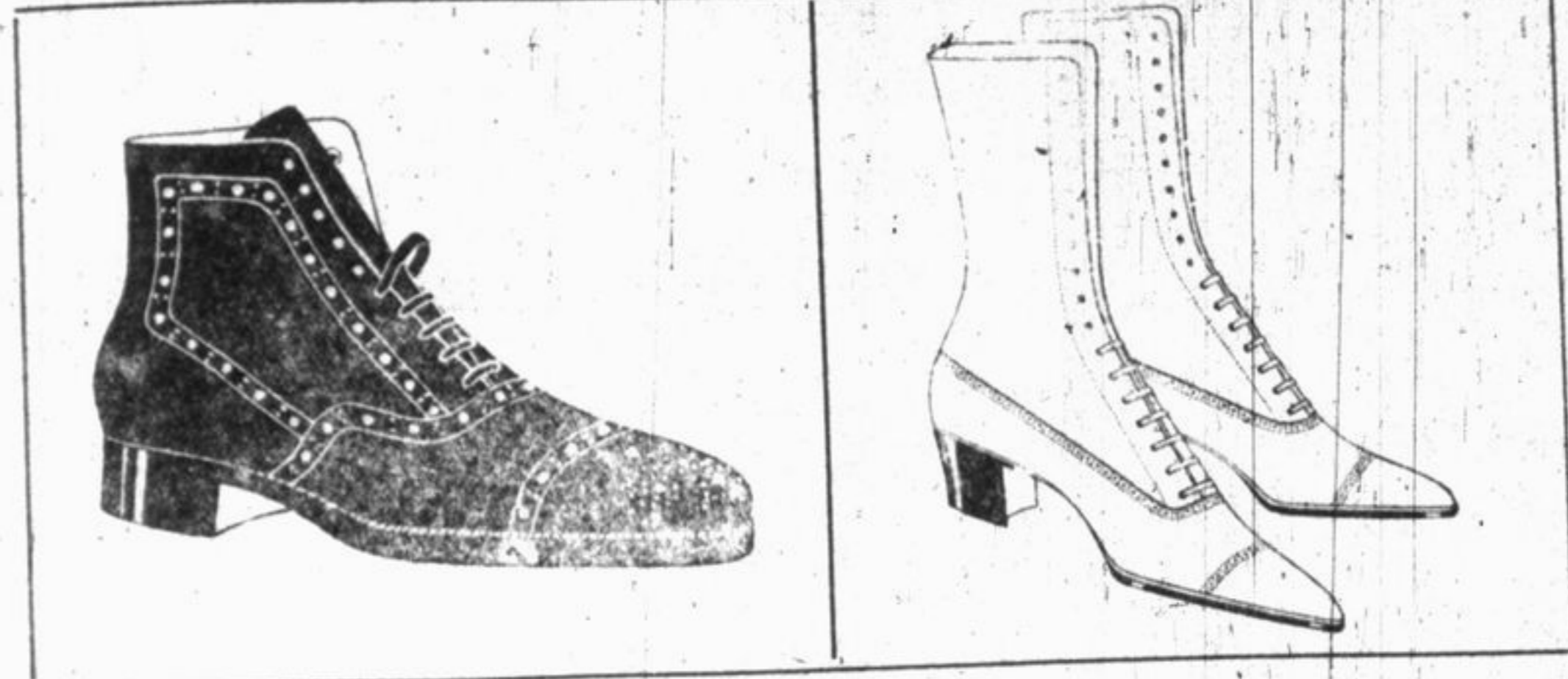

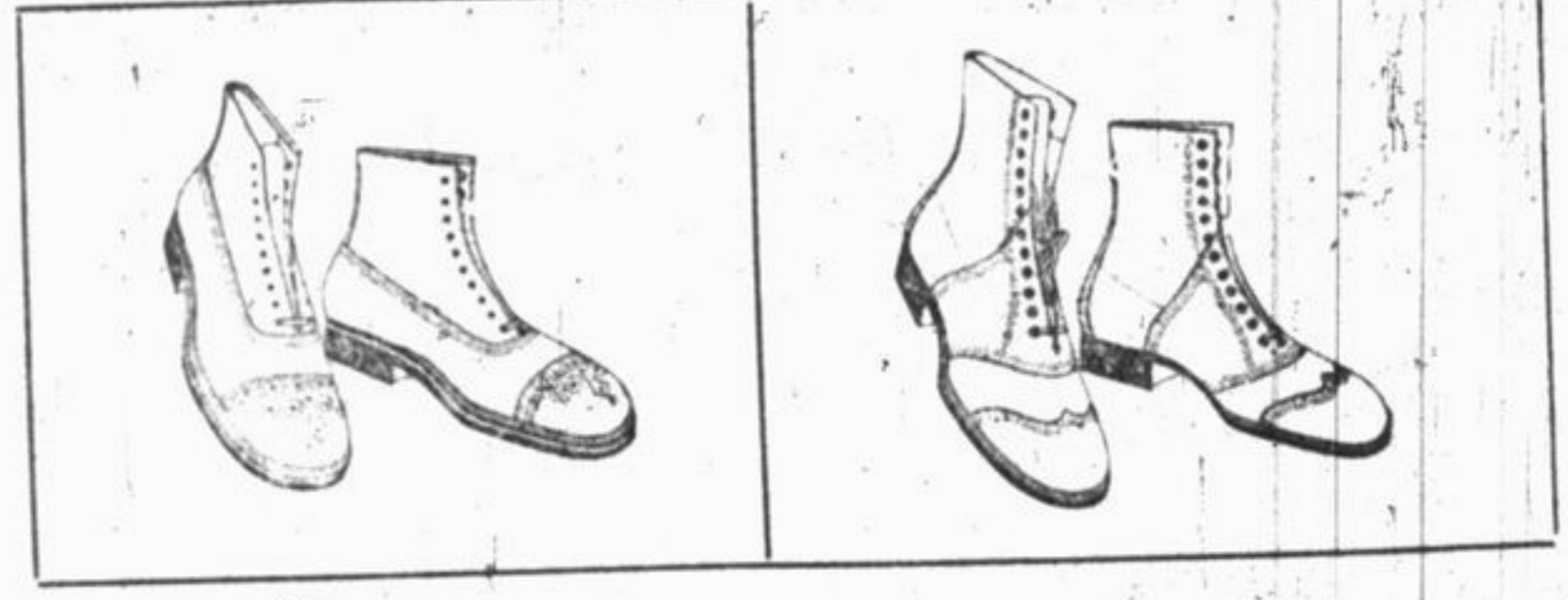

RECORD FOOTBALL CROWD AT A GAME

Two Hundred Thousand Witness Championship Battle On English Gridiron

An appeal to all farmers to sprinkle some grain along the hedge rows and fences of their farms during severe weather has been issued by William J. Stratton, of Ingleside, Lake County, chief game warden for Illinois. This measure is necessary to keep quail and other game birds from perishing when their food supplies are locked under snow and ice, Stratton asserts.

Quail have proven so valuable to the farmer in consuming insects that he can well afford to feed them a little grain during the winter, the game warden explains.

The necessity for supplying food to wild life is shown by the fact that rabbits are gnawing the bark off trees in many sections, he stated.

"This condition has become so acute in some parts of Lake County, it is stated, that much damage has been done to fruit orchards. If the rabbits were provided with other food they would leave the trees alone. There are a number of farmers in Lake County who long have made a practice of putting out food for game such as rabbits and quail, but according to the game warden the practice should be more general.

It is urged that historic spots be commemorated, but it might save more lives if the spots of automobile accidents were all marked as warnings to speeders.

Being urged to take a greater interest in public affairs, the curbstone crowd are carefully scrutinizing the public as it passes by.
