POLE FLIGHT HEADED BY ADMIRAL MOFFET

Northern Dash Also to Result in Trip Around Frigid Top of World

Rear-Admiral William A. Moffet, head of the naval bureau of aeronautics and the only man thus far chosen to make the polar flight with the dirigible Shenandoah, is well known in Lake county, where he served for several years as the head of the Great Lakes naval training school. Admiral Moffet has a double-barreled order to carry out on this polar journey—one of exploration of the north pole region and the other to bring his ship safely across the ice-bound region and home again via Spitzbergen and across the Atlantic, thereby completing a trip around the world by circling the north pole.
The latter phase of the trip appeals to Admiral Moffet more than the exploration trip in the polar regions and it is a remarkable fact that nearly everybody interested in the journey except the admiral had laid the greatest stress on the polar explorations rather than on the harder, longer and more noteworthy exploit of circumnavigating the globe.
