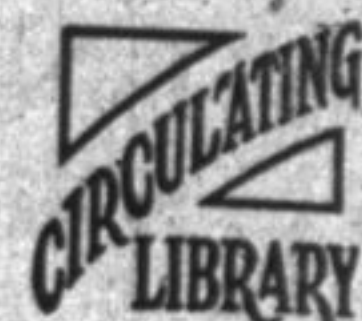
Besides the Oak Terrace school, North Chicago, Lake Bluff and Lake Forest belong to this league, the North Shore Grammar School Basketball League.
