WARNS MOTORISTS OF TAX INCREASE

POINTS TO ARKANSAS PLAN

Pres. Chicago Motor Club Uses Example to Show What Legislatures May Do In Other States

"A warning of the extent to which legislatures are piling on taxes of every description on the automobile owner is to be found in the case of Arkansas," says Frank E. Jack, president of the Chicago Motor Club. "To begin with the motor vehicle owner in Arkansas pays twelve and a half cents per horsepower plus fifty-five cents per hundred pounds of weight. If he has a popular priced car rated at 21 horse power and weighing 2200 pounds he will pay \$14.75.

"After he has paid for his license tag he must pay a tax of four cents per gallon on all gasoline he uses and 10 cents per gallon in all oil. If he uses 500 gallons of gas and 20 gallons of oil he will contribute \$22.00 more to the State. In addition he must pay a personal property tax."

What Arkansas has done in the way of special automobile taxes may be equalled by some other states.

"The American Automobile Association has been delving deep into the subject of automobile taxation in connection with its fight for the repeal of the Federal War Excise Taxes before Congress.

"The data gathered indicates the vital necessity of automobile owners being thoroughly organized for their own protection. I understand that the state of Arkansas does not have a single automobile club. Other states which are showing an inclination to follow Arkansas in motorist taxation either do not have automobile clubs or else the clubs are scattered and possess little united strength.

ABIE'S IRISH ROSE POPULAR COMEDY-DRAMA

Stanley Price & Martha Kretz Play Leads at the Studenbaker Theatre

Anne Nichols' comedy-drama, "Abie's Irish Rose" continues to bloom at the Studenbaker Theatre. During the coming week the usual popular priced matinee will be given Wednesday as well as the regular Saturday matinee.

The play shows the troubles, all of a humorous trend, that follow the secret marriage of Abraham Levy to Rosemary Murphy. After the ceremony "Abie" tries to make his own faith, and succeeds temporarily. Rosemary's father, when he finds that his son-in-law is a descendant of King Solomon, blows up with righteous wrath of a loyal member of the Ancient Order of Hibernians, but succumbs when he finds himself a grandfather.

As Abraham Levy, Stanley Price, a young doctor of much promise, scores a decided hit, which is shared by Martha Kretz, who takes the part of Rosemary. Both roles are distinctly juvenile, exceedingly pleasing and their interpretation is well executed.

Much of the comedy falls to the lot of Joe Greenwald, who as Solomon Levy, disowns, but finally forgives his son for marrying a girl of other than his own race. Rosemary's father, Patrick Murphy, played by Harry Garrity is another excellent comedy character. Other players are Lize Silbert and Harry Marks, as Mrs. and Mr. Isaac Cohen, friends of the Levy family, and also intimate with Abraham and his wife. The peace-makers are the rabbi and the priest, Dr. Jacob Samuels and Father Whalen, played by Tom Burrough and Bertram Marbaugh, respectively.

"Abie's Irish Rose" has become firmly implanted in the hearts of Chicago's theatergoers, as it has in the hearts of theatergoers wherever the play has been shown. Underlying the comedy, is a plea for religious tolerance and good will.

EXCELLENCE MARKS MUSICAL PROGRAM

Concert Given by Lansing Conservatory of Music; Miss Mayer Director

With the orchestra he sang an aria from "Martha" by Flowtow.
