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TOWNSHIP ELECTION HELD NEXT TUES

TICKETS AND CANDIDATES

Annual Town Meetings and Voting for Officers in This Township and West Deerfield

The annual township election in Deerfield township will be held on Tuesday, April 1. The polls will be open at 7:00 a. m. and will close at 5:00 p. m. Two tickets are in the field, the Citizens and the Peoples. The former carries candidates for all offices to be filled, and the latter only two candidates for the office of assistant supervisor, for which there are two to be elected.

This is the annual township election and is not to be confused with the state, county and district elections, to be held Tuesday, April 8, for nomination of candidates for election next November.

The Candidates

On the Citizens ticket in Deerfield township next Tuesday the candidates for assistant supervisor are A. W. Yersee and John H. Nichols. Albert Larson is a candidate for re-election as town clerk, and James H. Duffy is a candidate for re-election as assessor. John Freberg is candidate for re-election as highway commissioner.

On the Peoples ticket candidates for assistant supervisor are Martin Ringdahl and Fred Schaefer. No candidates are filed on this ticket for the offices of town clerk, assessor or highway commissioner. Hence the contest at Tuesday's election will be between the candidates for assistant supervisor on the two tickets.

Polling Places

The polling places in Deerfield township area as follows, and they also will be the polling places in the primary election April 8:

First precinct—City hall, Highwood.

Second precinct—Deerfield Shields high school.

Third precinct—H. M. Prior Company's office, 27 North Sheridan road.

Fourth precinct—Lake Shore Motors Co., 55 South St. Johns avenue.

Fifth precinct—Residence of Mrs. Fred Lindholm, 1453 Judson avenue.

Sixth precinct—Patten Brothers' store, 506 North Green Bay road.

Seventh precinct—Front office of Highland Park Press, also occupied by Paul Schroeder & Co. Real Estate office.

Eighth precinct—Hines Lumber Co. office, First and Walnut streets.

In West Deerfield

Annual township election in West Deerfield is held next Tuesday. There are two full tickets in the field and a warm campaign is in progress, reports from there state. In addition to the election of township officers the West Deerfield taxpayers are asked to vote on a question of public policy.

This is a proposal to raise by tax levy over a period of four years, at an annual rate of 50 cents on the \$100 assessed valuation, funds for the improvement of gravel roads, including all but those designated as state aid roads.

Independent ticket—For supervisor, James J. Hood; for town clerk, R. M. Vant; for assessor, Edward H. Selig; for commissioner of highways, William M. Selzer.

The annual town meeting will be held in the afternoon in both townships.

PURDYS SELL PART OF THEIR BUSINESS

Not to Build; Will Open Sport Goods Store; New Firm Buys Hardware

D. C. Purdy & Sons have changed their plans regarding building and instead have sold part of their present business and will open a sporting goods store in their property farther west on Central avenue about the first of April.

The Purdy firm has sold its hardware part of the business, including hardware, house furnishings and paints to W. D. Hussey of Amboy and L. H. Bourne of Dixon, who will move the stock purchased to the Moldaner & Humer building, North Sheridan road, where they will open a store.

D. C. Purdy & Sons will open their new store in the room opposite Sheridan road, now occupied by the office of Herman Schwery, R. Green-slade and Gilbert D. Johnson & Bro. Their stock will include trunks and bags and leather goods, radio and electrical supplies, bicycles and repairing, golf, baseball and other sporting supplies. They expect to vacate the building recently purchased by the Highland Park Storage & Transfer company during the month of April.

DEERFIELD PLANS BIG SEWER PLANT

TO COST OVER \$200,000.00

Board of Local Improvements of Village Submits Ordinance and Estimates; Provide For Future

The village of Deerfield is contemplating an extensive local improvement in the shape of a complete sewer system, with disposal plant estimated to cost about \$209,000 and adequate to serve the needs of the community for many years to come. The detailed recommendations of the board of local improvements and a copy of the ordinance submitted are printed in another part of this paper. The ordinance has not yet been acted upon by the council, but there is indication that the project will be carried through this year.

Extensive Improvement

This extensive local improvement is one of the largest projects ever attempted by a village of the size of Deerfield, and it is planned to take care of the needs of the people of that municipality for many years to come by which time, undoubtedly it will have taken its place among the cities of the state. The engineering work for this great public improvement is being done by Consoer, Older & Quinlan, and Arthur R. Wolfe is the attorney for the village in the premises.

Sanitary and Storm Water

The sewer system will include combined sanitary and storm-water lines with catch basins, manholes, regulators and all other necessary appurtenances. The streets, in parts of which sewers will be built, are Deerfield avenue, Woodward avenue, Osterman avenue, Lincoln avenue, Hazel avenue, Fair Oak avenue, Sheridan avenue, Second street, Grand avenue, Springfield avenue, Chestnut street, East Railway avenue, Central avenue, Orchard place. Sewers will vary in size from eight inches internal measurement to six feet by four. The system is to include:

Other Features

A sewage regulator consisting of a reinforced concrete float chamber and a valve automatically operated by a float and located at a point 20 feet southerly of the center line of Deerfield avenue and 124 feet easterly of the north and south center line of Section 32-43-12 to discharge sanitary flow from combined sewer in Deerfield avenue into said outfall sanitary sewer.

A sewage regulator consisting of a reinforced concrete float chamber and a valve automatically operated by a float and located at a point 20 feet southerly of the center line of Osterman avenue and 35 feet easterly of the center line of Union Drainage District No. 1 ditch to discharge sanitary flow from combined sewer in Osterman avenue into said outfall sanitary sewer; also 169 concrete manholes and 44 concrete catch basins.

Rapid Growth Expected

It is believed that the new territory will be rapidly built up, and it is expected that the city facilities, such as water, sewer and paving accommodations will be extended there as the growth in population of the district may demand.

Plat Approved

Commissioner Gourley moved approval and acceptance of a plat entitled Green's subdivision of Lot 35 (excepted the easterly five feet thereof) in Ravinia Woods subdivision. The motion prevailed.

Plat Approved

Commissioner Card moved approval of a map showing the territory annexed as described in the ordinance adopted providing for taking this new territory into the city, in compliance with the vote on the proposition on March 15.

Adopted Unanimously

At Friday's meeting of the council commissioners present were Cheney, Preston, Card and Gourley. Mayor Hastings was absent. The motion to pass the annexation ordinance was made by Commissioner Gourley and was unanimously concurred in.

On Motion of Commissioner Card

it was voted to approve the agreement by which the Chicago and Northwestern Railroad company grants to the city permit to construct, maintain and use a 12-inch tile drain upon the company's right of way near the east end of Gray avenue. The mayor was authorized to sign the agreement in behalf of the city.

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ANNEXATION ADDS THOUSAND TO CITY

POPULATION IS INCREASED

Ordinance Taking New Territory in Deerfield Township Is Passed by Council; Other Matters

An ordinance formally annexing to the City of Highland Park the territory, upon the annexation of which the voters of the city cast a largely favorable vote on March 15, was adopted by the city council last Friday evening, at its regular session.

The territory thus taken into the city includes all the remainder of Deerfield township, which was not previously within the corporate limits of Highland Park, Lake Forest or Highwood. It is estimated that the annexation will add about 200 families and nearly 1,000 persons to the population of this city. The territory is extensive but sparsely settled.

HIGH SCHOOL GRADS MAKE GOOD RECORDS

AS COLLEGE FRESHMEN

Reports Received at Deerfield, Shields Generally Good; Plan School Exhibit; Other Items

Reports from colleges of the work of students entered from Deerfield-Shields high school last autumn show the usual results. No student of the group has been dismissed from college for failure to do satisfactory work. Of 111 college grades so far reported, each grade indicating a student's work in a single subject, 78 grades were for work in subjects which continued high school course. Two of these 73 grades are below the college pass mark, both caused by the very late entrance of a student who changed colleges in mid-semester. Twenty-eight of the grades so far reported are for subjects not taken in preparation for college. Of these one was a failure. Of the whole number of grades reported for the first semester work 35 came from eastern colleges, the rest came from western. None of the former were below the pass mark.

Benefit Concert

The High School Benefit Concert will be held on Thursday, April 10th, in the Girls Gymnasium. The proceeds of the concert will help to pay for the new band uniforms. Besides choice pieces by the various musical organizations of the school, instrumental and vocal, there will be special dancing on the program and a humorous one-act play.

Exhibit of School Work

Plans are afoot for a big exhibition of school work in every department and room of the school for Friday evening, May 2nd. The school will be open at 7:30. From 8 until 9 there will be class demonstrations of the most interesting phases of the work as well as exhibitions of work done in all departments.
