MOVING TO SECURE FEDERAL BUILDING

BUSINESS MEN IN ACTION

Adopt Resolution Addressed to Congress; Urge Co-operation of Societies; Other Business

Resolutions were adopted at April meeting of the Highland Park Business Men's association urging congress to take the necessary steps to insure the securing of a site and the erection of a federal building in Highland Park as soon as possible now that the local post office receipts have placed it in the first class rank.

It was explained by Postmaster exceeded \$41,000, which for the first time in Highland Park's history places the post office in the first class, and as the lease of the building now occupied has only five years to run, it is time to be seeking other arrangements.
