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HIGHLAND PARK, ILLINOIS

FOURTH OF LAND IN STATE IS WOODLAND

Approximately one fourth of the area of Illinois is occupied with woodland, nonillable land, or abandoned land which might be made productive, according to A. N. Abbott, a prominent farmer of Morrison. Mr. Abbott has made a close study of the utilization of Illinois' agricultural lands and believes that much of the land now being wasted could be made to pay a profit.

According to his computations there are approximately three million acres of woodland and six million acres of abandoned and nonillable land in the state. This is equal to the combined acreage of wheat and oats in the state.

"Much of this land," Mr. Abbott said, "lies on farms that are producing a great profit, and with proper attention could be made as productive as the land surrounding it. Many hillsides that have been allowed to grow up with underbrush and small trees, would raise fine orchards, and if turned to horticultural crops would be very valuable. In southern Illinois this has been done in many cases, and some of the most valuable land in certain sections of the state was worth very little until it was used for orchards.

"Land that cannot be used in this fashion is often available for forestry purposes and will grow trees which can be transplanted and sold for ornamental purposes. Such land can nearly always be used for pasture, when no other profitable crop can be raised on it."
