Positions assigned to the 6 candidates for State's Attorney are in this order: Eugene Runyard, A. V. Smith, Wm. A. Deane, James G. Welch, H. J. Hansen and Herman C. Litchfield.

**No Democratic Candidates**  
 The Democratic column shows that there are no candidates for county positions and the same is true with reference to the Socialist's column.

**How Position is Fixed**  
 With reference to the state candidates, under the law they rotate; in other words, Gov. Small occupies first position in Lake County as the result of having been assigned first position in the Senatorial districts bearing even numbers. Lake County is the 8th Senatorial District therefore Small is in first position.

Essington will be in first position in the districts carrying odd numbers. In this way the various candidates for state and national offices rotate.

The ballot is by far the largest that has ever been used in a nomination or election in Lake County. It is the most unwieldy affair imaginable and those who start to scratch it will have some job on their hands.
