YELLOW CAB CO. IN NEW HEADQUARTERS

Takes Over J. & L. Garage and Office Will Be There; Other Plans

In order to still further increase the efficiency of the service it is giving the public the Highland Park Yellow Cab company has taken over the J. & L. George and Hitchfield Expected To Be Speakers at Woman's Club Auditorium

FAMOUS OPERA CO. IS NOW IN CHICAGO

San Carlo Company to Be Heard at The Auditorium Mar. 31 and Thereafter

Chicago is to hear the San Carlo Grand Opera Company for the first time, for, as the result of negotiations between its impresario, Fortune Gallo, and the executive heads of the Chicago Civic Opera, it will give a series of performances at the Auditorium, opening Monday March 31st, and terminating on Sunday April 6th.

Fortune Gallo wishes it understood that he does not come among us by way of competition or comparison with our own famous opera organization, but in the first place Chicago is the only important city in the United States where his company has not yet appeared, and next because he wishes to demonstrate here as he has done in New York and elsewhere that it is not impossible to give grand opera creditable at popular prices.

The strength of the San Carlo Company will be over one hundred, and it has a repertory of twenty present about twelve with suitable operas. Out of these it is hoped to scenery and costumes and the essential comitants of orchestra and chorus. Last fall at the spacious and magnificent Century Theatre, New York, the company completed its sixth annual engagement extending over five weeks, the audience constantly taxing the capacity of the house, while the public was as enthusiastic as the critics were approving.

There are not a few artists of distinction in Fortune Gallo's company some of whom have been heard at the Metropolitan Opera, New York, and in Chicago and Ravinia.

Last summer, when Fortune Gallo visited Italy he made some important additions to his company, and these too will be heard here. The company about to visit us has been appearing of late in Boston, Philadelphia, Washington, Detroit, Pittsburgh, San Francisco, Los

Angeles and other large cities in the East and West, and Fortune Gallo is hopeful that the favor shown there will be repeated here.

MAH JONG ITCH IS DUE TO IVY VARNISH

Japanese Lacquer Mixed with Juice of this Plant; Effects For Years After

The hitherto mysterious mah jong malady, manifest in some social circles recently reported, is no longer a mystery.

Nor is credence given the theory that those itching palms have any psychological aspect—such as the desire to win.

The phenomena is due to poison ivy, and is not caused by the titles, but by the lacquer of the cases.

Skin specialists and medical journals agree that the Oriental lacquer with which the cases are coated contains the juice of poison ivy and that the irritating propensities may be latent for so much as 400 or 500 years.
