NEW BUS LINE IS TO OPEN IN COUNTY
Proposed Route to Wauconda, Lake Zurich, Chicago; Company Incorporated

The Waukegan, Lake Zurich and Chicago Transportation company of Wauconda was incorporated at Springfield last week to operate a motor bus line between Wauconda, Lake Zurich and Chicago. The capital stock is \$5,000. The incorporators are A. M. Sowers, L. E. Sowers and Annette Sterling, all of Wauconda.

The proposed motor bus line will serve a large number of people living in the southwestern part of Lake county. Up to the present time the transportation facilities between Wauconda, Lake Zurich and Chicago have been far from satisfactory.

The early paving of Route 22, between Highland Park and Lake Forest, is very doubtful because of conditions arising from the annexation of that part of Deerfield township west of Highwood and Lake Forest also has a problem to meet, it was announced today by Charles E. Russell, County superintendent of highways.

Route 22 is the one extending from Barrington to Lake Forest and comes to the Highwood limits, following the Chicago & Northwestern railroad tracks on the west to Lake Forest to connect with the paving at Western avenue, which is paved with brick.

Lake Forest must vacate one mile of the route in the city limits before the state will pave it. The election last week in Deerfield township, at which time the entire township was annexed to Highland Park, created another difficulty. As Highland Park has a population of more than 2,500, and as the territory to the west is now a part of the city, the administration will have to vacate that part of the route before the state will pave. These obstacles block early construction of the east end of the route.

OTHER TAXES STILL REMAIN TO BE PAID
Internal Revenue Collector Calls Attention to Sales Tax Others Similar

Now that the income tax drive is over for this quarter Collector Reinecke cautions taxpayers on the subject of other forms of tax.

"Don't forget in your joy that your income tax is paid that there are the sales taxes and various other kinds," she warned yesterday, "and that we are still working under the 1921 Act."

"The tax on theater admissions, for example, should be kept well in mind and if exemptions are claimed the application for them should be made well in advance of the entertainment."

"Taxes which are added on to the price of admissions are collected from the public for the United States government, not for the theater owners. Theater owners should keep these receipts separate. They have no more right to use money thus collected for their own business expenses than you would have to use money you collect for your firm."

The proprietor of one theater on the south side who was delinquent in paying over taxes to the Internal Revenue office was indicted in 48 hours. It was proved that he had used government tax money to pay salaries with.

From the number of telephone calls received, Mrs. Reinecke said there were evidently persons who thought the theater tax and other sales taxes had been removed.

"We wish to stress the fact that none of the proposed tax revisions are yet laws," she declared. "If they pass Congress the public will be notified."
