### INVENTION GIVES SUBMARINE VISION

Italian Inventor Claims to Be Able to Overcome Laws of Refraction

Submarine warfare of the future will be revolutionized by the discovery of a young Italian naval expert, who claims to have discovered a process which will overcome the law of refraction and enable people to see under water.

The discoverer of the process is Prof. Leandro Guglielmotti, scientist and naval expert of Civitavecchia, who maintains that by the use of his process submarines would be able to detect the presence of obstacles even with their periscopes totally submerged.

Professor Guglielmotti's apparatus fitted to submarines would, it is claimed, project shafts of invisible light through the water which would illuminate any body coming in the direction and radius of their rays and would act within a radius of from seven to nine hundred feet and at a depth of fifty feet.

"The first idea of this discovery came to me in 1916, when submarine warfare was at its height," said the professor in an interview.

"I realized how helpless submarines become once they are totally submerged, and it occurred to me, how greatly their naval and strategic power would be increased if only a means could be found to enable the crews to see under water.

"The law of refraction of light presented an almost insuperable difficulty to this possibility. I had to call in the aid of another element, and after long studies and patient research I devised a method by which a line of light could be made to pierce the water and at the same time be invisible to aircraft watching overhead."

"I am confident that I have solved the problem which has been baffling scientists for years."
