BRIEF NEWS ITEMS FROM LAKE COUNTY

NEIGHBORHOOD JOTTINGS

Happenings of Interest Here and There in This Part of the North Shore; County Seat

James Dady, aged 81 years, of Waukegan, died last week of pneumonia. The deceased had been a resident of Lake county all his life. He was born Aug. 7, 1842 in the northeast corner of Libertyville township.

Southwestern Lake county was hit by a destructive hail storm Tuesday of last week. At Libertyville the pelting hail broke windows and street light globes.

Mrs. R. C. Green, more than 91 years of age and an invalid, residing at 718 Grand avenue, early Tuesday of last week cast the first vote of her life.

The Community Chest drive which will be made in Waukegan within the near future will be for \$68,700.

Taylor L. Godwin, 63 years old, died last week at the Lake County General hospital, death being due to heart trouble.

William Turner, 30 years old, employed as a driver for a Waukegan laundry, was held up, kidnaped, and robbed of \$165 by two youthful automobile bandits last week on Waukegan road.

That an immense shoe factory, employing 2500 men, has decided to locate in Lake County, was learned recently, following the purchase of a tract of one hundred acres of land at Rondout. The purchase of the land was made by Frank Goldberg of Chicago, acting for a big shoe factory now located at St. Louis.

Search for Earnest L. Faulkner of Antioch, who is being sought in order that he may claim a fortune of \$12,000 left by John Faulkner of Wausau, Wisconsin, received impetus last week when it was learned that a man named "Earnest Faulkner," formerly of Antioch, was an inmate of the poor farm at Libertyville up to a month ago when he was released to return to Antioch. Since that time he appears to have dropped from sight.

Lake County contributed \$126,931 in state automobile licenses according to statistics announced by Secretary of State Louis L. Emmerson in his review for 1923 and this county stands fourteenth in the state in the number of autos in use. Cook County stands first with \$3,230,180.

MERIT CERTIFICATES FOR STATE WINNERS

Highway Education Board Plans To Issue Honors in Its Essay Contest

Certificates of merit to students winning state honors in the annual good roads contest will be awarded by the Highway Education Board, it is announced. These emblems, handsomely engraved, will be offered as an additional incentive to the four years' scholarship and any state prizes that may be won.

With the closing date of the competition less than two weeks away, reports to the board from school officials indicate an even more widespread interest than has been manifested in previous years. Any student of high school grade, actually in attendance, is eligible to compete.

For certain states arrangements are now being made by the board to provide competent men and women to review the essays that are submitted. High school principals and teachers are requested to assist in making the first elimination, sending the best three essays from each high school to the board, or else to the state organization, in states where one has been selected.

Board officials said today that it was expected to receive at the Washington office the best three essays from each high school in California, New Mexico, Oregon, Minnesota and Illinois. Announcements of the results will be made as promptly as possible after the essays have been chosen.

ASK PERMIT FOR ANOTHER BUS LINE

North Shore Line Applies For Certificate for Additional Route

The Chicago, North Shore and Milwaukee railroad has filed an application with the Illinois Commerce Commission for authority to operate a bus line supplemental to present operation from Wilmette to Glenview, thence to Northbrook, Deerfield and Waukegan; also to operate in North Chicago.

BRONZE STATUE IS SET IN GRANT PARK

"Spirit of Music" Is Memorial To Theodore Thomas; on Granite Base

The great bronze statue of the "Spirit of Music," by Albin Polasek, was placed on its pedestal opposite Orchestra Hall in Grant Park, Thursday, April 10, and is now being made ready for the unveiling ceremonies which will occur in the near future. The female figure representing "Music" weighs 6,500 pounds, is 16 feet high, together with the half-globe on which it stands, and the granite pedestal

which supports the statue is 5 feet 6 inches in height. It was cast by the Roman Bronze Works, of Brooklyn, New York. The monument is a memorial to Theodore Thomas, and will be presented to the City of Chicago through the B. F. Ferguson Monument Fund, which is administered by the Trustees of the Art Institute.
