PLANNING CITY PARK AT RAVINIA STATION

COUNCIL RECOMMENDS IT

Initial Steps by Local Improvement Board; Contracts For Water Mains and Sewer Extension

Initial steps in the direction of acquiring a tract of land for park purposes near the Ravinia station were taken at the meetings of the city council and the board of local improvements held in the city hall last Friday evening. The plan proposed is to locate a long narrow piece of land for this purpose on the west side of the railroad tracks.

This tract will be approximately 2,000 feet in length by about 135 feet in width, if the plan suggested is carried out, and preliminary work on the project is under way.

At the council meeting a report was submitted by Commissioner Gourley on the park proposal, accompanied by recommendations, and on motion of Commissioner Cheney these were referred to the Board of Local Improvements, with recommendation that it act favorably on the plan.

At the session of the Board of Local Improvements the city engineer was instructed to prepare a full description of the property in the Ravinia Highlands subdivision which it is proposed to convert into park purposes and to include the estimated cost of the improvement in conformity with the recommendations of the city council.

The improvement board awarded five contracts at this session. The contract for the sanitary sewer extension in Northmoor Manor subdivision was let to the Highway Construction Co. at a price of \$10325.65. The T. H. Glehart Co. received the contract for the sanitary sewer in Ravinia court at \$1620 and also the water main in Ravinia court, the price for the latter being \$2361. This company was awarded the contract for the sanitary sewer in Lakewood drive at \$4014.30. The Melloy Construction Co. was awarded the contract for water main in Lakewood drive at \$3851.40.

At the city council meeting Commissioner Cheney presented bills which were approved and ordered paid, amount to a total of \$1984.03.

Present at this session of the council were Mayor Hastings and Commissioners Cheney, Card and Gourley. Commissioner Preston was absent.
