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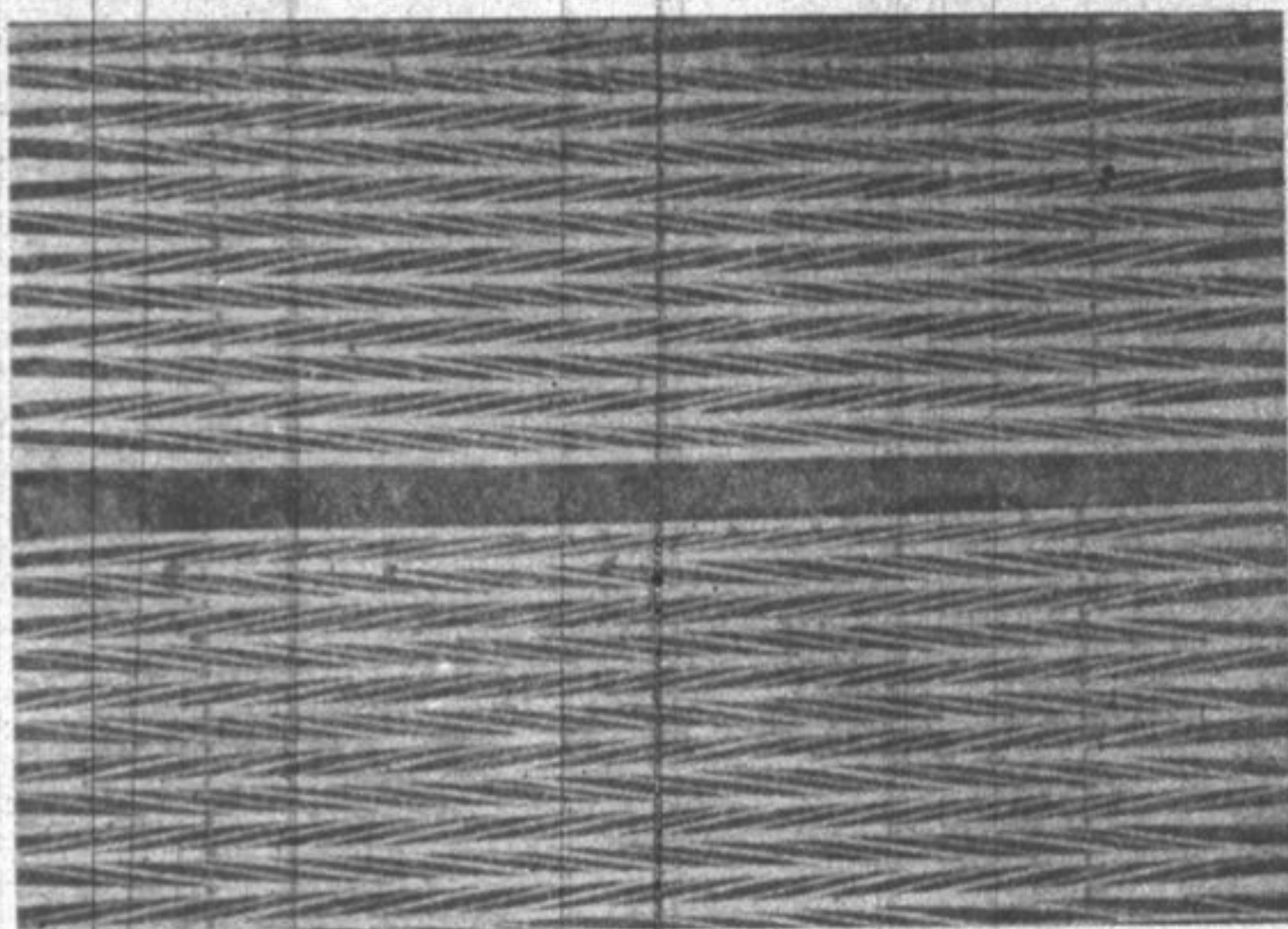

IDENTICAL panels with frames four feet high and eight feet long, constructed with sills and studs 7/8x3 1/4 in. and studs placed 16 in. on centers, were prepared.

FRAME A had one side covered with 1/2 in. dressed sheathing nailed at each stud with 5D nails, and the other side covered with common lath spaced 2 in. on centers and staggered in the usual way.

FRAME B was covered on both sides with Expanded Wood Lath sheets 8 ft. long and 16 in. wide, fastened at the juncture of each rib and stud with 5D nails.

In testing these panels the bottom sill was clamped to the base of testing machine and the pull applied to the top sill in the direction of its length.

Expanded Wood Lath, by this test, has been proven much stiffer than the old standard construction. But added to this advantage are its high insulating qualities and the much lower construction cost when used for exterior stucco or interior plaster.

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CAUSE OF DELAY IN PAYMENT OF BONUS

A LACK OF INFORMATION

Hundreds of Claims Fail to Give Necessary Data, Official of Board States; Being Investigated

Complaints of former service men in Illinois that they have not received their state bonus are "unjustified," inasmuch as no claim has been withheld by the service recognition board or "any other agency" for any other reason than that such a claim warrants investigation because of discrepancies, according to Palmer D. Edmunds, chief clerk of the board. "Hundreds of claims come into this office," Mr. Edmunds said, "in which applicants fail to give all information required as to their enlistment date, length of service, etc. I refer to one claim especially, the applicant of which publicly attacked Governor Small, a member of the service recognition board, because that service man had not received his claim. This man's claim is now being investigated at Washington. He does not even claim to be a resident of Illinois, his application showing that he was born in Wisconsin, resided there practically all his life, and furthermore, resides there now. This man does not even state in his claim the year of his enlistment. Such claims as this require thorough investigation, inasmuch as we have learned that his war record in the naval service has been sent to the adjutant general of Wisconsin.

Investigating Many Claims
 "The board is turning out claims as fast as it is humanly possible to do so. There are about 15,000 claims under investigation at the present time. We shall not pay out of the state's money to former service men until we know beyond a doubt that they are entitled to it. Claim number 190,737 is the highest one yet approved by the board. The total number of claims approved thus far, however, is about 175,000.
 "The war department and the marine corps headquarters at Washington have cooperated splendidly with this state in checking up claims of our service men, and prompt service has been given us by these branches of the government. The bureau of navigation, however, has not tended to show such prompt service, and our efforts to obtain information regarding such records of navy enlistments has been difficult."
