

PRESENT "WILDFLOWER" AT APOLLO THEATRE

Arthur Hammerstein's Musical Comedy Opened in Chicago Monday

"Wildflower," Arthur Hammerstein's current musical comedy success came to the Woods Apollo Theatre on Easter Sunday, April 20th, in all its glory and freshness, after a triumphal run of 60 weeks at the Casino Theatre with Edith Fay and the entire original cast and production, and a Broadway chorus of lovely young girls. The play will doubtless prove one of the treats of the season that is now drawing to a close.

One notable feature of the engagement here will be the augmented orchestra of thirty pieces conducted by Herbert Stothart who collaborated with Vincent Youmans on the tuneful score. The book and lyrics are by Otto Harbach, Oscar Hammerstein, 2nd, and the story, in brief, tells of Nina, a warm-hearted temperamental maid in Northern Italy, caught in the throes of an amusing love plot.

Miss Day, Arthur Hammerstein's vivacious young star, will, of course, portray Nina with all the warmth of her winning magnetism, her rich, modulated voice, and her gift of spontaneous joyous dancing. She it was who created "New" in New York, and who first won fame dancing "Tinkle Toe" in "Going Up." Bernard Gorey, veteran fun-maker of many of Arthur Hammerstein's successes, will appear as Gaston La Roche, about whose diminutive but imposing personality much of the fun revolves, and Esther Howard, the gifted comedienne, will appear as his vampish wife in several hits including "The World's Worst Women." Guy Robertson, endowed both as singer and actor, will be the lover. Other notable members of the cast are Bobby Higgins, Marjorie Bonner, Tyler Brooke, Marion Randall, Maryinez Randall, Jerome Daley. The music of the play is reported to be the best of many seasons. At all events there are ten notable pieces including "Bambalina," Miss Day's dance hit, "Wildflower," sung by Guy Robertson, and "Apple Blossoms" their love duet, which wins many an encore.

RADIO FANS THROG STUDEBAKER THEATRE

Following Broadcasting of Abie's Irish Rose; More Than 7000 Listeners Attend

The radio as a medium to attract attention to a stage play has never been better demonstrated than the broadcasting of Abie Nichol's "Abie's Irish Rose" direct from the stage of the Studebaker theatre, Chicago, on Tuesday night, April 1. More than 7,000 listeners-in deluged the Studebaker box office for seats to see this popular comedy in the first week following the broadcasting.

A statistician employed by the KYW - Westinghouse station estimated that close to one million persons heard the play as sent out over the ether from Chicago. Nearly a thousand letters were received by KYW and more than 900 were sent to the Studebaker from radio fans.

Two telephone girls were kept busy for five days answering the theatre phones night and day. Radio fans were not satisfied at only hearing "Abie's Irish Rose"; they also wanted to see it. An extra box office was opened to handle the throngs. On the day following the broadcasting one line of eager patrons reached the Auditorium Hotel 200 feet from the entrance to the theatre.

Telegrams came from Los Angeles, Salt Lake City, Denver, Portland, Me., New York City and points in Canada.

The entire play was broadcast, including the orchestral selections. Not only the funny lines but the laughter of the audience was heard by the fans. "Abie's Irish Rose" is the only play in America that has been willing to give radio fans this unusual treat. The show was broadcast from Pittsburgh, Columbus and Cincinnati previous to the Chicago event.

One man came all the way from New York City to see the play in Chicago after hearing it on the radio.

This is the first time on record where a New Yorker went to Chicago just to see a show.
