LAY CORNER STONE OF ELKS MEMORIAL SOON

Feature of State Convention in Chicago; Ceremony Held On June 7

Illinois Elks who attend the annual state convention in Chicago June 5-7 will have an opportunity of participating in one of the biggest events Elksdom has staged in many years—the laying of the cornerstone of the new Memorial home, which is in the process of erection at Diversey parkway and Lake Shore drive. At a conference of grand lodge and state officials it was decided to place the corner stone at two o'clock Saturday afternoon, June 7, with Grand Ruler James G. McFarland and members of his Official staff presiding. Prior to the exercises at the new Memorial Building, the entire staff of grand lodge officers will participate in the closing session of the State Association. Grand Exalted Ruler McFarland, it is announced, will install the newly elected officers. A luncheon will follow at the Chicago Elks club and the assemblage will then go to the site of the building. It is estimated that 15,000 Elks will be in Chicago for the event. IS YOUR PROPERTY TAX ON STRAIGHT?

If Not, Better See Assessor and Have It All Adjusted Properly

Assessor James H. Duffy is having difficulties and he urges that property owners who have purchased real estate in the last year help him out by calling at his office and furnishing accurate description of their property so bought, in order that the taxes may be properly distributed. Otherwise, when it comes time to pay taxes next year many who have not taken this precaution may have to make two or three trips to Waukegan before the tangle is straightened out, as the tax is charged often to an entire block instead of to the separate units, in case it has been subdivided since the last assessment. Mr. Duffy also wishes taxpayers who have taken out personal property schedules to return them to his office properly filled out. Dog taxes also must be paid at once.

Just in case we should forget and become dissatisfied with April weather, the weather man made public a statement discussing the March weather in all its dark details. March this year had more cloudiness than any March on record except in 1906, issued by Clarence J. Root, meteorologist sets out. The sunshine was only about one-half the March quota. The temperature was below normal almost continually during the month and the snowfall was two and one-half times the normal amount. Winter wheat, which was badly damaged in the southern and central counties by the severe cold of winter, was further damaged by thawing and freezing. Tornadoes swept over part of the state, lightning set fire to buildings and injured a farmer, heavy rains caused threats of floods. As if all this was not enough to condemn March as the villain of the calendar, the weather man adds to his indictment the fact that the roads of the state were almost impassable during the entire month and that practically all the farm work was seriously delayed.

MILK ORDINANCE ADOPTED WIDELY

Model Law Recommended by State Department Now in Force in 30 Cities

Thirty municipalities in Illinois have now adopted the model milk ordinance recommended by the state board of health, the department announced today. These ordinances, however, are not worth the paper they are written on unless they are strictly enforced, department officials warned, and strict enforcement depends entirely upon public sentiment. Contamination of milk is especially dangerous during warm weather because disease germs, like other vegetation, grow more rapidly when the temperature is high, the health department pointed out. Milk which has been properly pasteurized and then kept at a temperature not to exceed 60 degrees is safe for consumption, they stated.
