**WELL KNOWN MASON SUMMONED TO REST**  
Daniel T. Fitzgerald, Past Grand Master of Illinois, Dies At Normal

Daniel T. Fitzgerald, past grand master of the Illinois Masonic order, died last week at his home in Normal, Ill., following an illness said to have been produced by over-exertion, playing golf.

He was well known in Lake County, having been a visitor here many times at lodge events.

Masonic circles were shocked by the announcement of his death, because of his prominence and the fact that he had been taking an active interest in Illinois Masonic affairs. He was 55 years old. He was re-elected grand master of the Illinois Grand Lodge of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons at the eighty-first annual meeting in Chicago in 1920 and served until the election of the present grandmaster, Elmer E. Beach.

Mr. Fitzgerald was one of the best known Masons in the Middle West.
