VOLCANO ONCE WAS ACTIVE IN ILLINOIS
MILLIONS OF YEARS AGO

Hick's Dome in Hardin County Is Interesting to Geologists; How They Explain It

In a peaceful Hardin county pasture a short distance south of here are the remains of one of the few, and perhaps the only volcano that was ever active in Illinois.
Thirty, forty or perhaps one hundred million years ago, geologists say, this volcano was active. Although the area that remains of the crater is now not more than 200 yards across the character of the rocks contained in the volcanic plug indicate that when active the volcano threw up some very explosive material, and it is possible that southern Illinois was treated at that time to rather severe eruptions.
Very little volcanic activity occurred in Illinois in the time covered by geologic survey, and as a consequence most of the rocks and soil in the state, with the exception of that of glacial origin, are sedimentary deposits which settled when this part of the world was under water. Only in Pope and Hardin counties are evidences of such activity found.
Hick's dome, a massive bulge in the surface of the earth near here, is supposed to have been caused by the pressure of volcanic material underneath, and many flourspar and feldspar deposits are found in these counties. Such deposits were caused by molten material from the interior of the earth forcing its way thru cracks in the limestone. The age of these deposits, geologists say, cannot be determined, but it seems probable that they were present before the Rocky mountains in the west were raised above the surface of the surrounding plains.

Igneous Material
The volcanic plug near here is merely the igneous material, or rock formed by heat, that remained in the crater of the volcano when it became inactive. To the eye little indications of the volcano can be seen, and it is only by examining and analyzing the rocks and boulders that now are mixed with soil, that geologists have discovered the crater. Often these plugs project many feet above the true crater, the molten lava hardening as it strikes the air and being forced on up by pressure from behind. If this is the case here, the true volcano is still many feet under the ground and was buried as the surrounding country was built up by sedimentary deposits. It is possible, however that most of the top of the original volcano has been worn away and that what remains is on the bottom of narrow part of the crater.

ONE FEMALE FLY PARENT OF MYRIADS
Trillions of Offspring in One Season, According to Best Scientific Dope

By the time the female fly has lived through the spring and summer, a period from April 15 until August 28, she has become a great-great-great-great grandmother and under most favorable conditions her progeny could number five trillion—5,693,613,559,320 to be exact. That, says Dr. Herman N. Bundesen, Chicago health commissioner, is why every one should kill flies which have survived the winter.
Here are the facts and figures on which the health commissioner bases his five trillion progeny calculation:
"On April 15, a single over winter fly lays 120 eggs; on May 1, 120 adults issue, 60 of them females. On May 1 females each lay 120 eggs, and on May 28, 7,200 adults issue, 3,600 of the females. On June 8, the 3,600 females lay; on June 20, 216,000 females issue. These lay on June 30, and on July 10, 25,920,000 adult flies issue, half of them females. When these lay there is an issue of 1,555,200,000; and when the female half of these lay, there follows and issue of 93,312,000,000.
"From the female half of these there is an issue of 5,598,720,000,000, and adding up the whole buzzing swarm we finally have on Sept. 10, more than five trillion offspring of the one over the winter fly."

LAKE CO. BOOSTERS BACK ANNUAL FAIR
Plan to Give Away Large Sum To Secure Funds to Wipe Out Indebtedness
A group of men have organized the Lake County Boosters for the purpose of making the county fair at Libertyville this fall the biggest success in its history. It is the purpose of the Boosters to make such attractive award offers that thousands of persons not only from Lake county but from adjoining states will purchase season tickets to the fair which will run three days, beginning August 30.

It is believed that through this plan the fair association will be able to wipe out its indebtedness of \$18,000. The principal award will be in the neighborhood of \$25,000 or more. Other awards will total between \$5,000 and \$10,000 and will include a number of fine automobiles. Hundreds of miscellaneous awards will also be offered, including radio sets, sewing machines, electric washing machines, and similar articles.
The Boosters have not as yet worked out all the details of their proposition but will make further announcements from time to time.
