DEDICATE ACADEMY OF SCIENCE HOME

New Building at Washington Is Opened; Cost \$1,500,000; Features

Of unusual significance in the process of humanizing science is the dedication of the new home of the National Academy of Science and of the National Research Council in Washington, D. C.

The new building was erected at a cost of \$1,500,000 on a site overlooking the Potomac river and near the Lincoln memorial.

Public interest will be centered in a series of exhibits, not like those in museums, but arranged so the visitor himself may perform the experiment or verify the discovery they present.

Any visitor who enters the building unconvinced that the earth turns around may verify the rotation for himself by watching the swing of the Foucault pendulum suspended from the center of the dome.

The visitor also may see the effect of the collision of atoms and tracks of the flying particles with the alpha particles driven off from the atoms of radium at a speed of 20,000 miles a second.

The pressure of light, which was unsuspected even by scientists, until recently; the perpetual dance of microscopic particles of matter due to the jostling of the molecules, and a view of the outside world as it would look had humans the power of seeing by the "dark light" of the ultra violet rays are among the other exhibits in the building.

CARDINAL TO VISIT LAKE COUNTY MAY 25

Will Lay Corner Stone of Fine New Church at Area on That Date

Many people from cities in Lake county are planning to attend the laying of the corner stone of the fine new church at Area, and also to pay their respects to the first prince of the Catholic church to visit this county. The New World says: The first public official appearance of Cardinal Mundelein is scheduled to take place Sunday, May 25, when he will lay the corner stone of the church at the Seminary of St. Mary of the Lake, at Area.

Holy Name men are invited to attend this ceremony, and in anticipation of a large turn out of Holy Name men, their families and friends, the general officers of the Society have arranged for special trains over the Chicago-North Shore and Milwaukee electric line, which has a station near the entrance of the Seminary.

Thousands of people will attend the ceremonies, and special arrangements are being made for the convenience of Holy Name men and their families.

The special trains will run over the elevated lines, the usual route of the North Shore electric. The trains will leave various points at 15 minute intervals between 10 a. m. and 1:30 p. m., and a special reduced fare will be available. To obtain this rate, however, the tickets must be purchased through the central office, 163 West Washington street, Chicago.

TO BROADCAST Y. W. CAMPAIGN FEATURES

Chicago Stations to Include In Programs Talks for This Organization

Suburbanites, tune in on all the Chicago stations next week, beginning May 12, and get the news about the annual canvass for the Young Women's Christian association. The broadcasters figure that an organization that caters to over 37,000 girls every year, deserves to be helped. They have given space on their programs for speakers to tell of the activities in gym and pool, business girls' clubs, classes and summer camps that are carried on in the 13 different Y. W. C. A. branches. The central brass stringed instrument orchestra, and the glee club, will provide the music.

The Association centers of activity are in Chicago, but the girls come from all the suburbs, as well as from all over the country, to use the Room Registry and Employment Bureau, for Travelers and for Emergency Aid, and for vacations at the Y. W. C. A. camps, Forest Beach, at New Buffalo, Mich., Hammond for colored girls, at Wolf Lake, Ind. Millhurst on the Fox River, near Plano, Ill.

Business men are assisting women in their canvass and have formed an Advisory Committee to back up the efforts of the women. "The Y. W. C. A. is doing for the working girl what the Y. M. C. A. is doing for the working boy," said Mr. David Forgan, president of the National City Bank. "The girls need the protection, sociability and opportunities for improvement offered fully as much as the boys." Other members of the committee are Mr. Holmes Forsyth, chairman; Mr. Albert W. Harris, Mr. Cyrus H. McCormick, Mr. John G. Shedd, Mr. John Stuart, Mr. Kent S. Clegg and Mr. Leslie Wheeler.

STRANGE CASES IN JAPAN UNEARTHED

Episcopal Church Report Brings Out Interesting Phases Of Island

Among the reports received by the Episcopal Church in connection with its efforts to secure funds for the rebuilding of the missionary property destroyed in the Japan earthquake of last September is one from Rev. Yoshimichi Sugiura, a Japanese Christian priest who is spending his life among the denizens of "The Island" one of the abandoned sections of the Japanese capital.

Great Significance
Ten years ago "Nakamura" was a name of great significance to the police of Tokyo. The man whom it designated, a frequenter of the island, had a long criminal record which ran the gamut of the code. He had served ten prison sentences, of varying lengths, and the head of every police agent in the city was turned against him, when by mere chance he came under the influence of Rev. Sugiura. Mr. Sugiura, frail, soft spoken, the antithesis of all that Nakamura represented brought about such a change in the famous criminal's life that within a year he had not only abandoned his career of crime, but had become a member of the Christian Church and was enlisted as a worker in the Church of the True Light which Mr. Sugiura had planted in the heart of the abandoned section.

Learned Trade
Having learned shoe making during one of his prison terms Nakamura was induced by his benefactor to open up a small establishment in a suburb of Tokyo. The business prospered, and from time to time human wrecks whom Mr. Sugiura salvaged on the Island were taken out to Nakamura's and put to work in the shoe shop. Within a few years the establishment was affording employment to fifty men and once a week mission meetings were held there which were addressed by Mr. Sugiura and other Christian mission workers in that city. Then came the earthquake on September 1.
