### LAKE FOREST HAS BAD SUNDAY FIRE

Residence of Volney Foster Is Ruined by Flames Caused By Crossed Wires

Fire, believed to have been caused by crossed electric wires, ruined the large residence of Volney Foster, at Lake Forest, last Sunday evening. The roof was burned off and the third floor gutted by the flames before the Lake Forest department, aided by firemen from Fort Sheridan and Great Lakes, could get it under control. It was a stubborn blaze difficult to reach owing to the construction of the attic and third floor. The loss is estimated at around \$40,000, as the entire house was flooded with water. There is large insurance. Most of the contents was removed.

### JUSTICE CARTWRIGHT DIES VERY SUDDENLY

Dean of Illinois Supreme Court Suffers Fatal Attack At His Home Sunday

Justice James H. Cartwright, dean of the Illinois supreme court and one of the best known jurists in the country, died suddenly at his home at Oregon, Ill., Sunday shortly after 11 o'clock.

The eminent jurist suffered a heart attack while he was shaving. His son, William, member of the law firm of Winston, Strawn & Shaw, of 741 Cornish street, Chicago, was with his father in the bath room at the time of the death.

Judge Cartwright was in his eighty-second year. He had been failing in health for some time, but despite entreaties from his friends sat through the April term of court at Springfield.
